

ALBEE'S PLURALITY FOR MAYOR IS 6412

Only 1290 Votes Are Lacking to Have Given Majority on First Choice.

DALY AND BREWSTER HIGH

Their Places First and Second Respectively in Race for Commissioners, With Bigelow Third and Dieck Fourth.

MR. ALBEE'S PLURALITIES. Mr. Albee's plurality over Rushlight, 6290. On first and second-choice votes Albee's plurality over Rushlight, 6412. Mr. Albee was elected by adding first and second-choice votes. On first, second and third-choice votes Albee's plurality over Rushlight, 6129.

With the count complete H. R. Albee is elected Mayor of the City of Portland with a plurality over A. G. Rushlight of 6412. Mr. Albee lacked 1290 votes of receiving a majority on first-choice votes. His plurality over Rushlight on first-choice votes is 5290. William H. Daly and W. L. Brewster were the two high Commissioners and were elected for four-year terms. C. A. Bigelow and Robert G. Dieck were third and fourth, respectively, and were elected for two-year terms. Their votes on first, second and third-choice are as follows:

Will H. Daly, 20,807. W. L. Brewster, 18,420. C. A. Bigelow, 18,348. Robert G. Dieck, 18,021.

On first-choice votes the candidates for Mayor ran in the following order: Albee, 21,314; Rushlight, 19,028; McKenna, 3614; Kellaher, 2664; Smith, 789; necessary majority, 22,604.

On adding the first and second-choice votes, Mr. Albee passed the necessary majority of 22,604. The results on adding first and second-choice votes are: Albee, 25,440; Rushlight, 19,028; McKenna, 3527; Kellaher, 6193; Smith, 3211. Mr. Albee's plurality over Rushlight is 6412. Mr. Albee is therefore elected by that plurality. McKenna is 4201 votes behind Rushlight.

While it was not necessary to add the third-choice votes, the results on adding the first, second and third-choice votes were: Albee, 26,967; Rushlight, 20,808; McKenna, 20,069; Kellaher, 10,321; Smith, 3797. Albee's plurality over Rushlight was 6193. Rushlight's lead over McKenna was 229. The significant fact will be noted that McKenna ran Rushlight a close race when the totals on first, second and third-choice votes were made.

A. L. Harbur was elected Auditor by a majority of 23,172 over John Y. Richardson, his nearest competitor. The complete unofficial count follows:

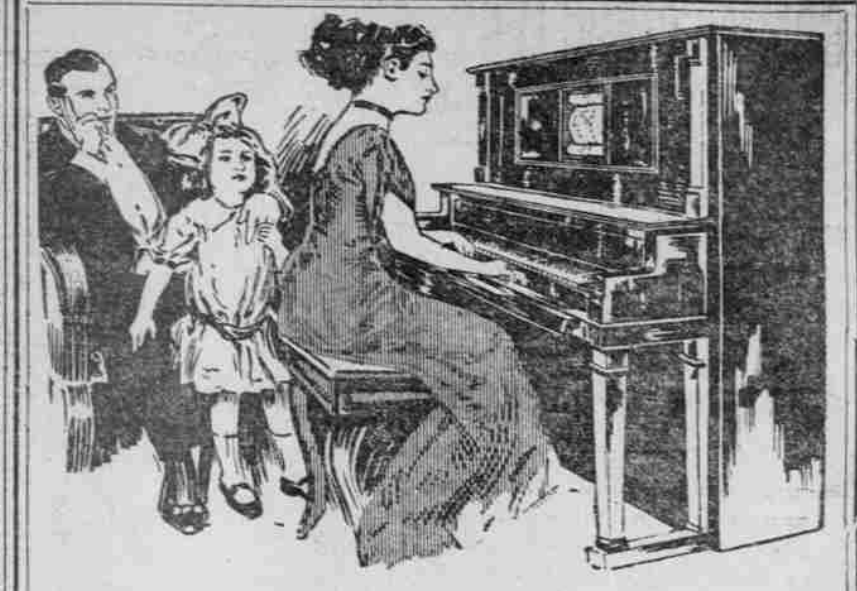

Notes From St. Johns

ST. JOHNS, Or., June 4.—(Special.)—A new skating rink on Jersey street has opened.

Surrounded by babies in great numbers and representing every type—accompanied by their mothers in most cases, by both parents in many cases, and by their fathers only in a few cases—the large corps of physicians and nurses conducting the scoring of infants at the Mothers' Educational Bureau yesterday passed a strenuous afternoon.
