NEW BILL STRIKES SNAG

MEDIATION ACT DECLARED NOT TO BE NECESSARY.

Secretary Wilson Says Needs of Hour Are Exceeded—Seth Low Disagrees With Him.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Vigorous opposition from the new Department of Labor to the proposed arbitration and mediation act, prepared by the railroads and railroad brotherhoods for enactment by Congress, was voiced today when the measure was presented to a joint session of the House and Senate Interstate Commerce committee.

Secretary Wilson criticized the new measure as going beyond the necessities of the hour. He suggested that the only emergency legislation needed was an increase of the size of the board of the mediators under the Erdman act. Seth Low, president of the National Civic Federation, had informed the committee that the railroads and brotherhoods had agreed on a new bill which would create a commissioner of mediation and conciliation, appointed by and responsible only to the President. This commissioner, with two designated Government officials, would constitute a board of mediation and conciliation to whom matters of dispute could be referred.

Mr. Low insisted that the movement was of tremendous importance in American industrial circles and that the bill should be passed immediately. He added that he was uncertain as to whether the railroads and the brother-

hoods would agree to Secretary Wilson's suggestion.

M'KINLEY FAMILY LOSES

Suit for Relics of Late President Won by Harry R. Cooper.

OAKLAND, Cal., June 20.—Relics that formerly belonged to the late President McKinley were lost to his relatives today by a decision rendered in the Superior Court, when a suit brought by Mrs. Marjorie McKinley Morse Heldt against her stepfather, Harry R. Cooper, was lost.

Cooper obtained the collection from his wife, Ida McKinley Morse Cooper, favorite niece of the martyred President. It included mahogany furniture, a gold plate bearing an invitation to the President to attend the christening of the battleship Ohio in San Francisco in 1904 and several other souvenirs.

31 STRIKERS GET 90 DAYS

Paterson Silk Mill Workers Given Suspended Sentences.

PATERSON, N. J., June 20.—Thirty-one striking silk mill workers, members of the Industrial Workers of the World, who were convicted recently of unlawful assemblage, were sentenced today to serve three months each at hard labor in the county jail.

As soon as the sentences were imposed the court suspended them, subject to the good behavior of the prisoners.

Australian Cabinet Resigns.

MELBOURNE, Australia, June 20.—The Australian Premier, Right Hon. Andrew Fisher, and the Cabinet resigned today as a result of the recent elections, in which the Liberals obtained a majority of one over the Labor party in the Federal House of Representatives.

OREGON MILITIA STIRRED

CRUISE TO PANAMA CANAL IN 1914 NOW PROPOSED.

California Reserves' Plans for Next Year Prompt Move to Prepare for Joint Voyage.

BY W. E. MAHONEY. ON CRUISER ST. LOUIS, San Francisco, June 20.—(Special.)—Plans of the Naval Militia of California for a cruise to the Panama Canal or Honolulu in 1914, have stirred the Oregon Naval Militia with a desire to participate and should the Navy Department approve a suitable vessel for the cruiser Boston, used as a station ship at Portland, the forces may sail in company. The Californians cruise this year to Santa Cruz from July 2 to 8, joining the torpedo flotilla there.

Captain George W. Bauer, of the California Militia, with Lieutenant-Commander George E. Kammerer, called on Lieutenant-Commander G. F. Blair, of the Oregon Militia, aboard the cruiser St. Louis previous to sailing today and a number of subjects bearing on the state militia laws, also on regulations of the Navy Department governing the two organizations, were gone over. It was agreed that the Pacific Coast States should cruise in company when possible for mutual benefit.

The St. Louis loaded 40 tons of ammunition here today for delivery at Bremerton and took on 20,000 gallons of water. A charge of \$3 for each 1000 gallons was made, and at Bremerton the cost to the ship is 3 cents, while at Portland 15,000 gallons were delivered without expense.

Son Born to Queen of Spain.

MADRID, June 20.—Queen Victoria of Spain gave birth to a son last night.

This is the sixth child born to Queen Victoria, the fourth being still-born. King Alfonso and Victoria, then Princess of Battenberg, were married May 3, 1906.

JERK BREAKS MAN'S NECK

Lumber Worker Drops Dead Soon After Accident Occurs.

CENTRALIA, Wash., June 20.—(Special.)—A peculiar accident here yesterday resulted in the death of J. W. Riney, an employee of the Chehalis River Lumber & Shingles Company.

Mr. Riney's son was passing heavy timber to him and the older man held one stick too long, the jerk dislocating his neck. Mr. Riney caught six more pieces before he was forced to go to his bunk and lie down. Fifteen minutes later he got up, hitched his horse, drove four miles to a Centralia hospital, climbed two flights of stairs and then died.

An examination revealed the fact that the man's neck was broken and that death was inevitable after the accident occurred. Mr. Riney was 53 years of age and is survived by his wife and son. His home is in Raymond.

Oyster Soup Contains \$100 Pearl.

CHEHALIS, Wash., June 20.—(Special.)—Arthur Woodruff, an inmate of the State Training School, at Chehalis, who has been ill and in the school hospital, yesterday was given some oyster soup, and almost choked on a pearl. A local jeweler pronounced it to be worth from \$50 to \$100. The news has caused a boom in business at the Chehalis cafes.

REFUNDS WILL BE PAID

RAILWAYS AND MINNESOTA OFFICIALS AGREE.

Roads to Be Called On to Distribute \$3,000,000 to Shippers in Next Six Months.

ST. PAUL, June 20.—At a conference with members of the State Warehouse and Railroad Commission held behind locked doors today representatives of railroads affected by the decision of the United States Supreme Court in the Minnesota case agreed to put into effect as soon as possible the state rates declared valid by the Supreme Court. These include the 2-cent passenger rate, the merchandise freight schedule and the commodity freight rate, enacted by the Legislature but never put into effect because of the injunction proceeding.

The agreement today ended discussion of further litigation by President Gray of the Great Northern, assured the state officials that there would be no further delay in establishing the state rates and that refunds due shippers for overcharges during the period of litigation representing the difference between the present rates and those made by the state would be paid at once.

The roads will be called on to distribute approximately \$3,000,000 within the next six months.

In 1909 after the commodity rate had been enjoined, the Legislature passed a law requiring the railroads to file schedules each month, showing all shipments made under the law and the difference between the state rate and those connected in each particular case.

These schedules have been kept up to date and the railways will pay over to the State Commission the amount represented, to be distributed by the Commission to the shippers entitled to the rebates. Attorney-General Smith

has been asked to formulate a plan whereby this may be accomplished.

ARABS ARE PUT TO ROUT

One Italian and 19 Soldiers Killed in Battle in Tripoli.

ROME, June 20.—A severe battle fought between the Italian troops and the Tripolitan Arabs at Etang yesterday cost the lives of one Italian officer and 19 soldiers, while five officers and 217 men were wounded.

The Arabs were completely routed.

Veteran Weather Observer Resigns.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—After 18 years of service as head of the San Francisco Weather Bureau, Alexander G. McArdle has resigned to accept the professorship of meteorology and the

directorship of the Bluehill Observatory, at Harvard University. He will relinquish his present post just before the opening of the Fall term at Harvard. Professor McArdle will succeed the late Professor A. Lawrence Rotch, founder of the Bluehill Observatory, who was the first professor of meteorology at Harvard.

James McGuire Is Suicide.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 20.—James McGuire, of Portland, Or., committed suicide by jumping overboard from the steamship Mariposa, on which he was a passenger on his way home from Seward, Alaska, to spend his vacation, according to cable advices received from Ketebikan, Alaska, where the Mariposa called yesterday. McGuire jumped overboard last Monday while the Mariposa was steaming from Cape St. Elias to Cape Spencer. Passengers who saw him notified Captain O'Brien, but before assistance could be given McGuire sank.
