

SHIPPING BEHEMOTH MAY NOT BE LEFT

Captain Dollar Warns Americans Not to Expect Too Much From Canal.

BRITISH ADVANTAGE SHOWN

Steamship Owner Also Discusses Embargo on Northwestern Lumber With Representatives of Portland Organizations.

Captain Robert Dollar, the veteran steamship man of the Pacific, repeated in Portland yesterday his warning against expecting immediately too much tonnage from the American registry through the Panama Canal.

The difference in cost of transportation is the lower interest charge and insurance rate for the foreign craft and the lower operating figure where the former is permitted a large percentage of Asiatic crews.

All three of the Portland men in the conference with Captain Dollar are to represent the Portland Chamber and the Portland Lumber Interests at a conference in San Francisco called by the Chamber of Commerce.
