PRICES AT CLOSE SHOW FEW IMPORTANT CHANGES.

Trading Is of Small Proportions. Rumors of New Financing Causes New York Central Break.

NEW YORK, June 27.—There were few occurrences in today's trading to distinguish the stock market from the narrow professional affairs of the last few days. Stocks rose at the opening in a half-hearted way in response to high prices in London, and then allowly fell back. Trading in wheat, as in other grains, reached a volume considered by some to surpass that of any previous day this season. It was estimated the yield in Kansas would not amount to more than 72,000,000 bushels, whereas speculators of late had been counting on about 90,000,000 bushels.

Heavy selling on the part of leading houses checked the upturn in wheat, but the top prices of the day were current within 15 minutes of the close. The late strength was influenced by assertions that rains northwest had falled to appear where most wanted in South Dakota.

Total clearances of wheat and flour equalled 403,000 bushels.

Primary receipts of wheat were estimated in South Dakota.
