The absolute contradiction of the positive utterance of one of the leading New Thoughtists of the North by one of the leading New Thoughtists of the South caused considerable comment among the delegates yesterday, and elicited the question as to possible differentiation of the New Thought doctrine because of climatic conditions.

"When you really desire to commune with God, go into a quiet place, sit or lie down, relax every muscle, let the body become as still as death, and then for a few moments meditate on God's omnipresent life and love. Then take one sentence of our prayer and affirm it from your inmost heart; then wait and watch the thoughts that God will and watch the thoughts that God will send to your mind as an answer," was the advice given the audience by Perry Joseph Green, minister of the New Thought Temple of Truth, Portland. Printed copies of the prayers were distributed to the audience, together with full directions for use.


