# LIGHTNING IS FATAL TO MAN IN WOODS

### HEAVY RAIN DOES DAMAGE

Downpour Follows Flash That Cost library. Life of Frank Coady in Logging Camp-Dixle Meadow Is Hit by Serious Cloudburst.

BAKER, Or., July 25.—(Special.)— Details of the death yesterday of Frank Coady, aged 35, who was instantly killed, and John MacPherson, who was killed, and John MacPherson, who was fatally injured, when three other men and a team of horses were seriously shocked by lightning, became known today at the Oregon Lumber Company's camp, six miles from Whitney.

The men were hauling logs when the bolt flashed. When the dazed men recovered they telephoned here and the lumber company sent a doctor from Sumpter by special train.

Coady is a Canadian and well-known among the lumbermen of Eastern Oregon. He is not married.

The bolt was followed by a downpour that did much damage. A cloud-burst at Dixle Meadow earlier in the afternoon also was damaging.

IDAHO SUFFERS BY STORM Damage to Crops, Livestock, Build-

ings, Reaches Many Thousands. BOISE, Idahe, July 25 .- (Special.)-Cloudbursts last night caused damage estimated at thousands of dollars in Southwestern Idaho, according to reports reaching Boise tonight. have been ruined, property destroyed and hundreds of head of stock drowned. reported.

Among other things, General Murray discussed was the rumor that James J. Hill was negotiating for the purchase of Vancouver Barracks for large rail-

ond shops. When General Murray arrived in the post, being brought here from Portland by Major Adrian S. Fleming, Seventh Brigade Adjutant, with head-quarters here, the Twenty-first Infantry was formed and presented arms to its chief. A salute of 13 guns was fired in his honor. He is accompanied by Captain Herbert J. Brees, aide-de-

Procedure Is Suggested.

When asked concerning the rumor of James J. Hill's offering to buy Vancouver Barracks and to give in ex-change for it a much larger area, with quarters all built after regulation requirements for a whole brigade, General Murray said, "I heard about that this morning for the first time. If Mr. Hill has a real first-class proposition, have those who are talking about it get him to put it down on paper, just what it is, and perhaps then the Government will listen to it. The Secretary of War will be the first one to hear of it, and after that Congress will have something to say.


