To Lead Fleet to Portland on Battleship Oregon Navy Chief's Fond Hope.

SECRETARY PRAISES STATE

Government Is Declared Under Enlightened System, in Speech at Commercial Club Banquet. Party Goes to Spokane.

"It will be the proudest moment of my life when I come through the Panama Canal a new duty and responsibility will arise for those who are to have charge of the control of our Navy. After the completion of the canal, the United States fleet must come to stay on the Pacific Coast as much as it stays on the Atlantic Ocean.

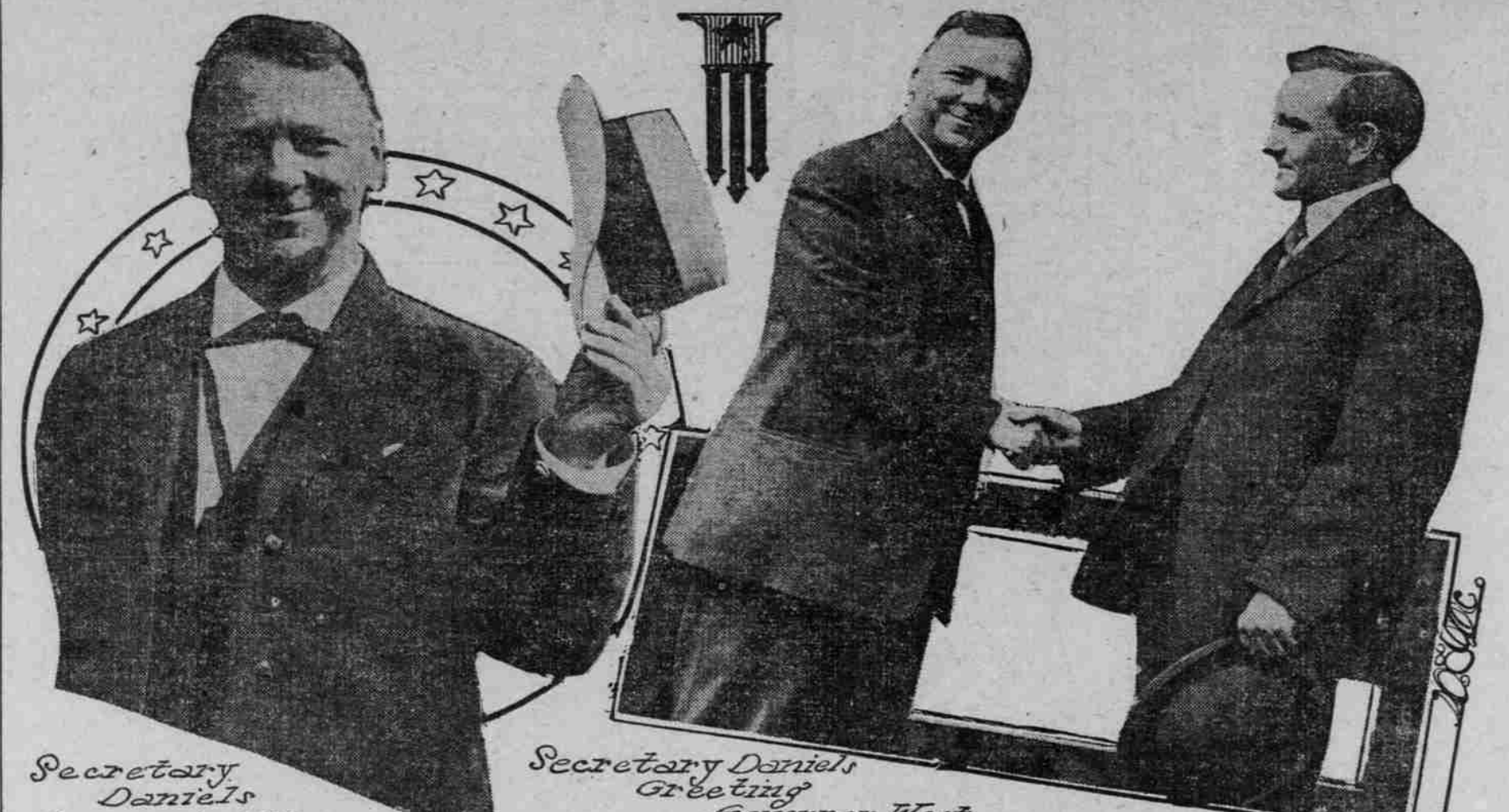
"I have come to this Coast on an educational trip. I come to look at your ports and ascertain the conditions and possibilities that exist here so that I can go before Congress and make intelligent recommendations for the legislation that will be necessary to enable us to prepare these ports for the time when the fleet of the United States shall come to the Pacific.

Secretary Daniels congratulated the citizens of Oregon on the "enlightened system of government under which the state is living.

RAILROAD LOSES IN COURT

Refusal of Tender of Taxes Upheld by Court at Salem. SALEM, Or., July 28.—(Special.)—Circuit Judge Galloway today decided that Sheriff Each was justified in refusing to accept the tender of taxes by the Oregon-California Railroad in this county, because the special road tax, as provided in a bill passed at the last session of the Legislature, was not included. A writ of mandamus, asked by the railroad against the Sheriff, was denied. The company contends the bill is not valid. The decision sets a precedent for every county in the state, and the case probably will be appealed.

Hood River Wants Pathologist.

HOOD RIVER, Or., July 28.—(Special.)—Efforts are being made to have the County Court appropriate funds from the county budget to employ an experienced pathologist to aid the Oregon Agricultural College in its work of experimenting with methods for the eradication and prevention of disease pests in the county. A petition, which was started at the Chautauque at Woodworth last Friday is being signed, and the court has signified that if enough of the people express themselves desirous of the expenditure of funds in this manner, they will make an appropriation.

Government Doctor Takes Life.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 28.—(Special.)—Dr. A. T. Watt, superintendent of the Government quarantine station at William Head, committed suicide yesterday by leaping from the third-story window of a hospital. He was instantly killed. Mr. Watt had suffered for several months from neurasthenia, and the recent death of a brother and the serious illness of a son caused a breakdown.

From the hill the party was driven swiftly to the Fourth-street dock, embarking on the Government supply boat, the James N. Farnance, from Fort Stevens, Captain Albert Barron commanding. The boat ran a mile out in the harbor, enthusiastic Astorians telling Secretary Daniels the depth of water at different places and pointing out many other advantages.
