MULVEY'S APPOINTMENT BY SULLIVAN IS CAUSE.

Pacific Association of American Athletic Union Threatens to Keep Members Out of 1915 Games.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—The appointment by James E. Sullivan, secretary-treasurer of the Amateur Athletic Union, and director-general of amateur athletics at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition in 1915, of "Tom" Mulvey to be assistant director-general, has been followed by such resentment here that the Pacific Association of the Amateur Athletic Union, in an open letter signed by President John Elliott, refuses to allow Ralph Rose, George Horine or any other of its members to compete in 1915 if the appointment stands.
