

GALLAHAN WINS 2 GAMES FROM GIANTS

Portland Southpaw Holds Seattle to One Run in Each Contest.

COLTS CROWD VANCOUVER

Former Washington State Leaguer Works 15 Consecutive Innings Without Allowing Opponents to Score.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 17.—(Special.)—Callahan, the former Washington State League left-hander, established a Northwestern circuit record for the present season this afternoon when he pitched the Portland Colts to victory in both games of a double-header.

Callahan pitched 15 consecutive innings of shutout ball. Seattle scored only two runs in the 15 innings, one to each game, and Callahan finished even stronger than he started. The scores were 7 to 1 and 3 to 1. Vancouver won and lost in Spokane, so Portland is only 13 points behind the leaders.

The Colts gave their southpaw excellent support, especially around second base. Bancroft and Mohler handled the ball with lightning rapidity. Callahan had an easy time in the first game, as Portland scored two runs in each of the first three innings. Dell was hit hard and his support was bad. Reardon finished the game and pitched good ball, allowing only one run and seven hits in six and one-third innings.
