CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Grain markets were today lower all around. Corn, though it had lost much of its recent activity, continued to be the center of interest. Net losses of to % 6 % in wheat, and 14 in oats. Pro-visions closed irregular 3 % lower to 71%

Selling of corn by influential longs depressed that market after a little bulge in September. Selling pressure was felt early in the session, the bears accepting reports of scattering rains in the corn belt (most of it, however, outside of the Southwest) as being beneficial, though some experts held that the full was too light to help the drought-parched crop much.

Much of the bearish feeling displayed by the market was due as the long continued period of buillish control. Bids from the South at figures over Chicago prices failed to rally the market nor did the fact that cash receipts were very light help the buills. In spite of some anxiety over probable damaging results of too much rain in the Canadian Northwest wheat was on the down grade nearly the entire session. An advance of the in Liverpool closing prices did not sustain the local market, and it sagged with corn. Prospects of increased wheat atocks in the Southwest by the middle of September also served to send prices down. Free selling of oats weakened prices after a strong opening and covering by shorts gave strength to provisions for most of the day, but at the close free offerings


