In detail Lindner ambled first base being hit on the knee by Chech. Doane bunted and registered a scratch hit when Chech threw too late to second. Johnson mused up Kores' grounder through short, which same was put down as a hit, and Lindsay scored. Doane being nabbed at third base.

Berry then grounded out and Krause took up his trusty bludgeon. His effort was a grounder to third. Metzger scooped it, tried to tag Lober, who dodged, and then threw several yards over Moore's cranium, Kores and Lober scoring.

The Angel infield put up a holler to Umpire Finney, basing their protest on the charge that Lober had run out of line, but Finney laughed at the kicks and the scores were put down as official.

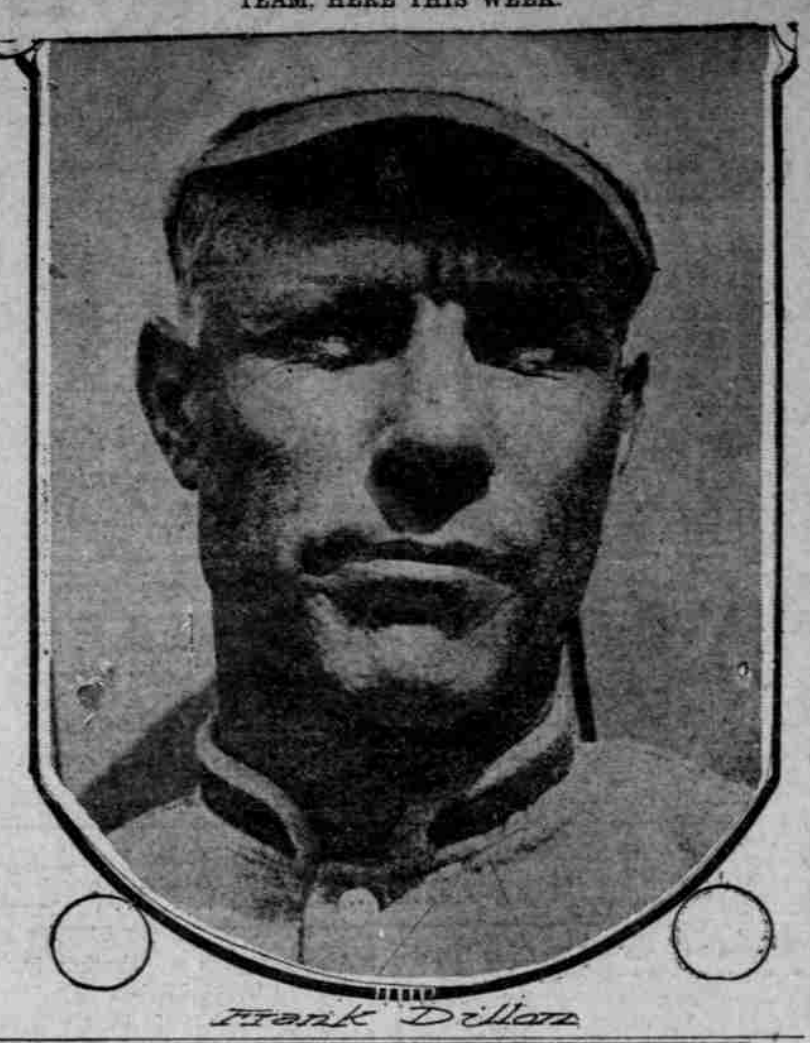
