

NATIONAL TENNIS CHAMPIONS WIN

McLoughlin and Bundy Out-class Strachan and Griffin at Newport.

STRAIGHT SETS TELL TALE

San Francisco Boys, Aged 24 and 18, Show Excellent Teamwork, but Are Unable to Withstand Terrific Smashes by Champion.

NEWPORT, E. I., Aug. 20.—On the Casino courts here today M. E. McLoughlin and T. E. Bundy, National doubles champions, successfully defended their title against J. Strachan, aged 18, and C. J. Griffin, aged 24, the challengers. The championship pair defeated their youthful rivals in straight sets at 6-4, 7-5, 6-1, and even these figures do not express the margin of victory always in the hands of the older and more experienced players.

The challengers played their best game, even when they were defeated. The champions were piling up the points. An adequate idea of the difference in the play of the two pairs may be gained from the fact that McLoughlin and Bundy scored 28 earned points to 21 by their younger rivals. On nets, double faults and outs by their opponents, the champions gained 71 points while giving away 67.

McLoughlin and Bundy appeared to be slow in getting into the match in the younger pair frequently killed Bundy's short lobs for points. They played to the latter at every opportunity, for Bundy's game was far from perfect. He was unable to handle the severe service troubled the youngsters.

Strachan and Griffin made their stand in the second act, but while they carried it to a close, they were unable to break through. Bundy here played the steadier game, while McLoughlin's finished spectacular smashes. At the finish the champions had swung into their old-time game and simply smothered their youthful challengers.

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OREGON KID WINS CHAMPIONSHIP RACE

Baby Reliance Furnishes Great Competition Until Rudder is Lost.

FAST TIME IN TRIAL HEATS

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—(Special.)—Oregon Kid was favored with a reversal of the hard luck experienced in Tuesday's races and the 20-footer was piloted to victory in the 33-foot class by Harry Great in the United States championship.

The day's races brought out the second fastest time of the carnival, the Oregon Kid turning 12 miles in a preliminary heat in 17:27 or at the rate of 14 miles an hour. Adam Weekley's Barnacle was disabled by motor trouble on the first stretch of the initial lap. Kitty Hawk V led the Oregon Kid all the way to the finish.

Two-Boat Race From Start. From the start the Kid developed into a two-hog race. The Kid leading and the Baby in hot pursuit. At the finish of the first lap there were but 2-2 seconds between them, with the Kid leading.
