Rollin L. Dixon, and Major James Mo-Laughlin, an inspector of the Interior Department detailed by Secretary Lane to accompany the doctor.

It is six months since Dr. Dixon and his little band of Indian civilizers started out from Philadelphia on his mission. The doctor's full title is leader of the Rodman Wanamaker Expedition of Citizenship to the North American Indian, the idea being Rodman Wanamakers, who is a son of John Wanamaker, she millionsire dry goods man of Philadelphia and New York and Postmaster-General under President Cieveland.

In that six months Dr. Dixon and his party have traveled almost 25,000 miles, 3000 of which have been by stage over the mountains. It is a mission that requires the utmost delicacy, for many of the Indians have real or imaginary grievances against Uncle Sam Diplomacy is Essential.

It required something of a diplomat and a man who could inspire confi-dence under these adverse circumstances to approach the Indians, and Dr. Dixon has been peculiarly successful in this altruistic work.


