

DOANE'S FEEL IN CONTROL

Hard Smash Breaks Up Tenth Inning Game and Gives Beavers Four Straight.

HAGERMAN'S SUPPORT FINE

Fisher's Remarkable Throwing Offsets Pitcher's Wildness—Fans Go Home From Park Wild-Edged. Kenworthy's Error Fatal.

BY ROSCOE FAWCETT. Sacramento's defense crumbled in the tenth inning yesterday and Portland, for the fourth successive time of the series, gumped up the pennant possibilities of the Senator.

It was a furious struggle all the way through. For nine amazing frames play after play the two teams fought to the aid of the faltering twirlers, Hagerman and Munsell. For nine innings Portland fans looked on with bated breath.

Then in the tenth Kenworthy, the Wolves' second sacker, booted Rodgers' grounder and, after a sacrifice by Kenworthy, Doane whacked him home with a screaming single along the right field foul line.

Doane's poke gave Portland another corner on the glove mark. The thousand fans—half of them of the feminine species—qualified once again for the pean pavilion. Once again an exhibition of the Senator's prowess was staged in the McCredie stadium.

Fans Wildly Excited. If there had been an alienist in the crowd the Frank Alleys, the Brandt Wickershamms, the Billy Fangles, the Dave Weisses and all those other red-hot fans would find something to be excited over their way to the "hally" house.

There was enough comedy, tragedy and other features flocked around the requested spots to start a dozen movie scenarios.

It is only necessary to say that Hagerman walked eight Solons and hit another to show how close local chapeaux were to the half-mast angle. Four times Jimmy Lewis walked and started assaults that looked like finishers, but even Wolverson's continued umpire-nagging failed to rattle the locals.

And so, lest it be forgotten, let us repeat that we are one game closer to the 1913 Pacific Coast League championship—yes, nine and one-half games to the front, thanks to Doane and his three swats, thanks to Lober, thanks to Speas, thanks to Lindsey, and, above all, thanks to Fisher.

Gas Fisher Saves Game. Fisher's wonderful throwing to bases did more, really, to save Hagerman's epidermis than any other feature of the defense. Four times Gas nabbed the visiting speed merchant at second base and then the visitors, too late, started something that would have added to the membership roll of the local lodge of sorrow.

Hagerman allowed a double steal game and walked eight; Munsell allowed nine hits, walked five and awarded five gratitudes.

Portland took the lead by a run in each the second and third innings. Doane's walk and hits by Lober and Fisher presented the first; Chadbourne hit, his second hit, a double steal game and a double steal gave us the second tally.

Sacramento greeted Hagerman with a volley of small arms in the third inning when Tennant's double and singles by Hallinan and Munsell scored two and enough to tie.

This 3-2 arrangement went through to the last of the tenth, but not without many tremulous times for both sides.
