PORTLAND GROWTH NOTED

Business Conditions Improving, Says Eastern Railroad Official. That business conditions in and about Portland have been improving in the last few months, was the opinion expressed by G. L. Estabrook, of Philadelphia, secretary and assistant treasurer of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, who has been in the city for two weeks, making an inspection of the property of the company. Mr. Estabrook is one of the chief assistants of C. M. Clark, chairman of the executive board of the company, and has a reputation as a keen observer as well as an able financier. NEW CARLINE IS SOUGHT

East Halsey-Street Residents Raise Fund to Help in Construction. The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company has been asked by the East Halsey Street Improvement Association to build an electric railway on East Halsey street from the Sandy boulevard and East Thirty-seventh street to East Eighty-second street. Property owners and residents of that district have raised and offered a cash bonus of \$16,500 as part of the cost of construction of this line. The extension will be nearly two miles long, and the cost is estimated at about \$37,000. According to the statistics there are now 850 families immediately tributary to the proposed extension, or between 2000 and 4000 people, who must walk an average of one mile to reach either the Montavilla or the Rose City car lines. Offer of the money was made to the street railway company several days ago, but no answer has yet been received.

BOOSTERS TO VISIT YAKIMA

Development Association Delegates Also Plan Trip to Roundup. NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Sept. 9.—(Special.)—Delegates returning from the Southwest Washington Development Association meeting held at Goldendale Wednesday and Thursday will reach North Yakima Sunday morning at 7 o'clock, and their schedule gives them two hours at this place. The delegation is composed of business men from Centralia, Chehalis, Hoquiam, South Bend, Tacoma, Montesano and Aberdeen. The party has a special train of six or eight Pullmans. The meeting at Goldendale will occupy two days and the special will go to Pendleton for one day at the Roundup before starting home.

PARK COMMITTEE NAMED

St. Johns Officials to Select Sites for Public Playgrounds. ST. JOHNS, Or., Sept. 9.—(Special.)—Mayor Charles Bredeson, City Attorney O. J. Gatzmeyer, representing the city, and D. C. Lewis, representing St. Johns Commercial Club, are the committee which will select the four tracts for parks and playgrounds from the tenders which are being made by property owners. Sealed tenders will be received till next Tuesday, September 15, when they will be opened at the city hall. These tenders must show number of acres, location and price. From these the committee will select four tracts. When cost and location of the selected parks are known a special election will be called.
