SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—(Special.)—Fifteen thousand delirious fans packed Recreation Park to cheer San Francisco to the echo this afternoon, after a 4-5 victory over the Oakland Red Sox in the morning. Pete Standridge, the novice, backed up by healthy stickwork, once more trimmed the Beavers, 5 to 1, and scored in seven out of eight games for the lowly Seals.

As a baseball game, pure and simple, the afternoon spectacle could not be called the best game in the world, but the packed house did not care. All they wanted was for San Francisco to win, so the early and quick acquisition of a lead by the Seals was greeted with more applause than if the score had been up and tuck. Krause followed Higginbotham, and while the latter was likewise touched for six swats, he got away with just one run registered.

Game Decided Early. The game was practically won and lost when a third way over. Mundorf, first up, planted a safe one in right and McCardie scratched. Johnston scratched a hit to short that took a bad bound and Mundorf came all the way around from second. Hogan's out carried Johnston to third, and when he started to steal third Fisher's throw was so far wide of the base-man that Johnston completed the circuit.

With one down in the second, Nig Clarke singled to center, chiefly because Chadbourne and Downey got their signals crossed. Standridge grounded out to Higginbotham, but Mundorf beat out a hit to first, Derrick trying to beat the runner to the bag in the third. Krause Holds Seals. Harry Krause, who worked thereafter, staved off further run-getting until the sixth, when Cartwright clipped a two-strike ball to left field, took two strikes and the Seals were out of short and scored on McCardie's liner through Krause.

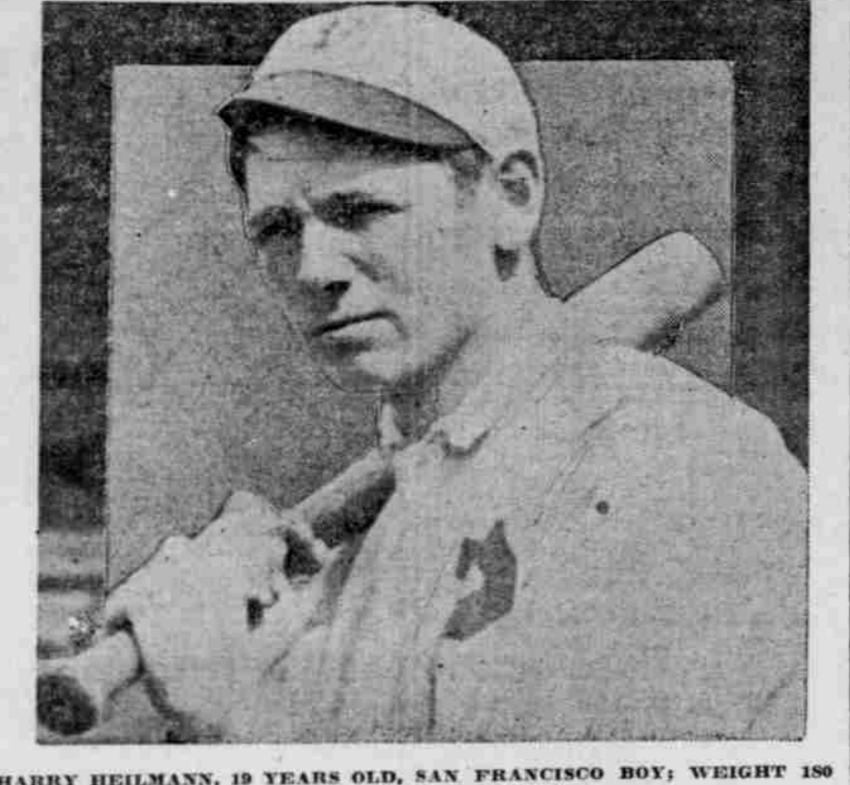

DRAFT SEASON HERE

Heilmann Almost Sure to Be Called by Majors.

5 OTHERS LIKELY WANTED

Beavers Can Only Lose One Man in Lottery—Rodgers, Lober, Speas, Doane and One Pitcher Are Probably to Be Sought.

With the major league drafting season—September 15-20—opening today, Portland fans will watch with interest the results of the lottery. The Beavers have but one man from the Coast club at \$2500 and an unlimited number from the Northwestern team at \$1200 a man.

"I feel certain that we will lose Harry Heilmann, of the Colts, said President McCredie last night. 'We may also have to part with Bancroft, Callahan, Mars, Hynes and Murray; for the majors can grab them all if they want to.'

"So far as the Coast club is concerned," added Mr. McCredie, "drafts will likely be levied against Lober, Speas, Doane, Rodgers and possibly against one of the pitchers. The majors are allowed to take only one player from AA clubs, so the choice will undoubtedly rest in the drawing of cards from the hat."

Harry Heilmann at \$2500 sounds almost as good as Colonel Astor's purchase of Manhattan Island for \$24, Heilmann is unquestionably the most promising all-around athlete the Northwestern League has turned out in several seasons. He is hitting .314 and has played nearly every position on the club, at present being stationed at first.

Jimmy Richardson recommended Heilmann to last Winter after watching him in the San Francisco City League. If Jimmy never does another bit of scouting, he can sit back and point to Heilmann. For his pains the Western Tri-State umpire will likely draw down a big slice of Heilmann's price.

Jimmy Toman said last night he had positive knowledge that St. Louis, Cincinnati and Cleveland would all have drafts in against the loose-jointed star. The McCredies released Bancroft, Heilmann, Mars and one or two others from the Colts to the Beavers several weeks ago, but that protects them only against drafting. In the Coast League drafts will likely be levied against Elliott, Hesp and Koester, of the Venice club; Johnson, Boles and Margert, of Los Angeles; Johnston and Fanning, of San Francisco; Moran, Williams, Shin and Young, of Sacramento, and Rohrer and possibly Pruitt, of Oakland, in addition to the Portland contingent mentioned above.

The Class AA draft season opens two days after the close of the major, namely, September 17 and 18. Drafts are allowed to take one man from A league teams from which the majors did not draft, one man from B teams and an unlimited number from lower classifications.

Portland's drafts will not be given out until the lists have closed, but Catcher Haworth, of the Peoria club, is said to be one of those in line. Hap Hogan, of Venice, has announced that he will attempt to draft Catcher Schmidt, of McMinnon, and Outfielder Messenger, of the Birmingham club of the Southern League.
