SPOKANE CRIME RECALLED

Mrs. Anna Kelley Says She Know Who Killed Reno Hutchinson in 1906-Police and Y. M. C. A. Officials Are Skeptical.

Mrs. Anna Kelley, who lives at the apartments, Twenty-second and Washington strets, reported to the police yesterday that the man who murdered Reno Hutchinson in Spokane in October, 1906, was following her, and was intending, she believed, to take her life.

Mrs. Kelley, who teaches in a mis-sion school at 182 Russell street, said that she formerly lived in Spokane, and that she was familiar with the killing of Hutchinson, which occurred in front of the Y. M. C. A. building in that city.

She told Detectives Swennes and Hill that for several days a man who, she is sure, is the murderer of Hutchinson, and whose part in the act was never laid bare, was staying about the mission with intent to kill her. the possible motive.

Mrs. Kelley described this man as being tall and dark, with a mustache, and she asked for police protection. A mark of mud upon the door of the place she pointed out to the officers as being a sign left by the suspicious extranger. stranger.

The police are not inclined to give credence to the story several remarks of Mrs. Kelley with regard to her knowledge of the Spokane crime, being shadowy. She said, in explanation of her belief, that the man was the wanted murderer, that she was given the newer to see such things and underpower to see such things, and under-stood his connection with the crime by more than mortal means. In spite of the apparent unlikeliness of the clews offered the detectives are trying to find the man.

H. W. Stone, general secretary of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association, scouted the idea that Mrs.

Kelley's tale had any foundation.
"In the last three years," he said,
"we have had nearly 20 clews to the murder, in some cases apparently so good that we thought it was a matter of but days until the murderer would be arrested. I have had three persons since 1906 write to me and assert they were the murderer, one sending a pho-tograph. The case has been given wide publicity, and I think that is why so many persons bob up with clews about it."




