COLLEGE SHOWS GAIN

ENROLLMENT AT CORVALLIS TO DATE IS 1323.

Total Registration of First Semester
Last Year Is Exceeded by More
Than 100 Students.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Sept. 29.—(Special)—The latest figures submitted by Registrar Tennant of the Oregon Agricultural College, last night, indicate a total enrollment to date of 1323 students. The total registration during the entire first semester of last year was 1265, and, as it is expected that the total for this year will be swelled to about 1400, the indications are that the college is growing at the rate of about 10 per cent each year.

Although, owing to the rush in the registrar's office at this season of the year, Mr. Tennant is not as yet able to give detailed statistics regarding the apportionment of students among the various departments, he states that the two largest schools are those of agriculture and domestic science and art. There are between 300 and 400 students enrolled in each of these departments. Of the total number enrolled, 900 are men and 423 are women. Students who were A. O. A. last year have returned to continue their work this semester, and of the remaining 480, 441 are registered as freshmen, while 39 bring credentials from other colleges and universities which entitle them to advanced standing. The students come from 18 states, Canada, Hawaii, Philippines, England, Greece, Jamaica, China, Japan and India.

BIG CONVENTION SURE

HOOD RIVER PLANS GOOD TIME FOR DELEGATES.

Federated Women's Clubs of State to Gather October 6 When Many New Clubs Will Be Seen.

HODO RIVER, Or., Sept. 29.—(Special)—A convention of the Federated Women's Clubs of the state, which will convene here on Monday morning, October 6, will be the largest ever held," says Mrs. Charles H. Castner, president of the local Woman's Club.

"During the past year we have affiliated 15 new clubs and delegates from others will be present to swell the list. The gatherings of the federated organizations will be open to the general public, except the reception, which will be given for the delegates, their husbands and out-of-town visitors and invited guests."

FIGHT FOR ESTATE IS ON

Alleged Deserted Wife Files Claim at Spokane.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 29.—(Special)—Denying that a person calling herself Rose Marie Arbicular is the wife and that William Arbicular, deceased, is the son of John Arbicular, who died in March, 1912, leaving a \$20,000 estate here, Giovanni Bozzolo, of Italy, guardian of three children of Arbicular by another woman, today answered in the Superior Court and denied his wife and child which bids fair to parallel the case of Susanne Enos, the squalor, who laid claim to the estate of "Portuguese Joe."

Rose Marie Arbicular has filed a claim to half the \$20,000 estate of the deceased Italian, declaring that she was

denied a daughter.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Sept. 29.—(Special)—The advisory committee and County Commissioners met with Architect Osterman today to discuss the proposed new Courthouse, and a preliminary plan submitted by the architect following his return from a trip of inspection over the country, which was accepted. He was ordered to go ahead and work out the plan more fully. It was decided to do away with a tower and also a statue of "Justice" on the building, cutting the cost by about \$40,000. It was declared.

The building, which is to be a reinforced concrete structure, will cost \$150,000. It will be 116x188, and ample for years to come. It is believed, there being provision for two courtrooms, with another room that can be used for a courtroom. The building will face on Fifth street, whereas the present Courthouse faces on Main street.
