many gun stores which issue them.
Early in the day the books with which
the dealers were furnished earlier in
the season had each stub filled out.
The limit has been reduced to five in
any day, and this number will be easy
to reach, for the beautiful birds have
become so tame that the hunter who
cannot use the front end of the gun
with the proper results can club them
to death.

Game Warden to Be Busy.

State Game Warden Finley will have a particularly large force of deputies in the field to watch against the killing of female pheasants. When young the male and female look very much alike, and he expects to get many hunters who will have to stand a fine of \$25 for killing the wrong kind of bird.

He will also have men watching to see that there is no shooting inside the city limits. Portland is one of the game reserves, and the flocks which are continually rising from the long grass in the suburbs will be tempting, but Mr. Finley will have enough men on hand to make shooting a costly practice.

Islands Are in Reserve. It is not generally known, but Ross Island and Swan Island, at opposite ends of the harbor, are both in the game reserve. These places are literally covered with pheasants. The game wardens will be on hand with several fast motorboats.
