WASHINGTON MOOSE PARTY NEAR ROCKS

Division of Progressives Over Senatorial Campaign Issue Now Seems Imminent.

LEADERS DODGING TARIFF

Jones Is Attacked in At Divert Attention and More Discord Follows-Poindexter May Be Democrat.

OLYMPIA. Wash., Oct. 16.—(Special.) -What to take for a campaign issue for the coming Senatorial fight is a question on which Progressive leaders are at sharp variance. So decided is the conflict of opinion that a split into

the conflict of opinion that a split into rival camps seems imminent.

The three Bull Moose members of Congress from this state—Senator Poin doxter, and Representatives Falconer and Bryan—are inclined to agree that the tariff is the only real issue that has developed since the campaign of 1912. But on which side of the tariff question to allign themselves these men are sharply divided, Poindexter and Bryan having voted for the Underwood tariff

bill, while Falconer opposed it strongly.

Bryan, who is an avowed candidate for the Senate, is busy pointing out, in all parts of the state, that under the mstances it would be impossible for Senator Poindexter to support Fal-coner for the Senate. That Poindexter has definitely alligned himself with Bryan in the Senatorial fight, as was predicted some time ago, now seems to be generally accepted as fact. Tariff Votes Cause Change.

On the other hand, prominent organs which supported the Progressives durwhich supported the Progressives during the last campaign are now assalling Peindexter and Bryan for their
votes on the tariff. This element in
the party, it is believed, would be willing to accept Falconer as a Senatorial
candidate.

Should Falconer get the Progressive

nomination this would leave little choice for Poindexter and Bryan but to support the Democratic nomines for the Senate, in the opinion of state politicians. In fact, for months past there have been reports affoat that Ppindexter was preparing to return to the Democratic party. The junior Washington Senator comes from a Democratic family in Virginia and no one heard of him being a Republican until he landed in Washington politics.

Pointing still more strongly toward a possible return of Poindexter to the Democratic fold is the fact that he has been able to exert much influence with nomination this would leave little

been able to exert much influence with the Wilson Administration. The Pro-gressive Senator is given all credit for the appointment of Clay Allen, of Se-attle, as District Attorney. It is known that his influence was largely responsible for the naming of Jere Neterer as

Furthermore, Poindexter secured the appointment of a Seattle follower, Herman W. Craven, as member of the National Civil Service Commission and has succeeded in having his only appointee of importance under the Tafi Administration, Walter P. Edris, continued in office as postmaster at Spokane, several months after his term had expired.

Bryan, like Poindexter, is from the south, has Democratic leanings, and the strong Republican majority in this state is regarded as the primary reason following that party's standard on locating here.

Again, if Bryan should get the nomination for the Senate, Progressives who have been criticising sharply his stand on the tariff question almost surely would go over to the Repub-lican camp. Even the nomination of some candidate other than Bryan or Falconer would be unlikely to relieve the situation, as the tariff seems bound to be the National issue to be settled in this states at the next election. The Progressives, who treated this question in generalities during the last cam-paign, now are being called on to determine definitely whether they will go in the protection or the near-free
