WOMEN FURNISH MEN SERVE BANQUET.—A banquet, furnished by the women, and served by the young men of the neighborhood, was one of the features of the men's meeting at the Hawthorne Park Presbyterian Church, East Twelfth and Taylor, Wednesday night, to organize a neighborhood club. Waldo E. Stewart, W. W. Samson, Charles W. Pallett, Oglesby Young and M. G. Pike were appointed to draw up plans for the organization. R. F. Barnes, W. O. Munzell, G. W. Pallett, O. C. Johnson and M. G. Pike were among the speakers. The intention is not to make a club for church members alone, but to start an organization which will include the whole neighborhood. Plans for a Thanksgiving dinner were suggested. About 60 were present.

MISS SCHIEWE REGAINS CONSCIOUSNESS.—Dr. H. F. Ong, who is attending Miss Lydia Schiewe at the Good Samaritan Hospital, said last night that Miss Schiewe had about an even break for recovery. She was run over by a taxicab Sunday evening and sustained a fracture of the skull and abdominal injuries, which have resulted in hemorrhages. Last night Miss Schiewe was a little better and regained consciousness Wednesday afternoon for the first time since her accident.

CIVIC LEAGUE ANNOUNCES MEETING.—William Fielding Ogburn will preside at the pre-election civic luncheon arranged by the Oregon Civic League for Saturday night at the New Oregon Hotel Fountain Grill. William MacKenzie, secretary Stationary Engineers' Union, will speak in favor of the workmen's compensation act, and Hamilton Johnston will oppose it. MOTOR BOAT CASES DISMISSED.—The four motor boat cases, in which Eskel Heikkila, Jorgen Gabrielsen, J. Poppey and Franklin Knight were the defendants, were dismissed in the United States District Court yesterday. Judge Bean considered that the law had been vindicated sufficiently in that the defendants already had paid penalties to the collector of customs for running gasoline motor boats without having on board adequate fire extinguishers.

J. H. REED SENTENCED.—In the United States District Court yesterday J. H. Reed was sentenced to nine months in the county jail for impersonating a Deputy United States marshal. He was allowed 10 days to file a motion for a new trial. Reed was convicted October 21, 1913, for that, in his pseudo-capacity as deputy marshal, he attempted to arrest Dr. C. J. Dean and R. S. Parker, both of this city.

October 9, Redford was granted a 30-day stay of commitment on account of his wife being ill.

Mrs. Atstock and Miss Rose Kennedy. The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock from the St. Francis Church, East Twelfth and East Pine streets.

ELDERLY WOMAN ATTEMPTS SUICIDE.—Despondent over the loss of one arm and one eye, injured in an accident several weeks ago, Mrs. Mary Baker, 55 years old, attempted suicide yesterday in her room at Fourteenth and Pettigrove streets. She stuffed the cracks of door and windows and turned on the gas. Persons living in the house noticed the odor and broke down the door. She was removed in an Ambulance Service Company machine to St. Vincent's Hospital, where her condition is said to be critical.

WHEELER'S SALARY GOES ON.—The City Commission yesterday passed a resolution providing for the payment of the salary of J. N. Wheeler, chief inspector in the Public Works Department, while he is confined because of injuries received in an accident on East Sixth street and Portland boulevard last Saturday. Wheeler in trying to escape running his automobile into a bakery wagon skidded the machine into an old gravel pit. The machine turned over twice, seriously injuring Mr. Wheeler.

LARD COMPOUND TO BE EXPORTED.—Six carloads of "lard compound" will go from Portland to Manila on the Hamburg-American steamer C. Ferd Laeisz, which sails from Portland on November 4. This is the first shipment of the kind from this city and has been made possible by the recent inauguration of Oriental service out of Portland. The "lard compound" is manufactured by the Union Meat Company, which aims to build up an extensive Oriental trade in this commodity.

GUERRILLA TACTICS USED AT SIXTH AND ALDER STREETS LAST NIGHT when street orators attempted to speak from a moving automobile. Agnes Bean, Hilma Karliquist and Lena Furstag were arrested for refusing to comply with a traffic ordinance and Joe Pastor was arrested for disorderly conduct. The zeal and conduct of Edward Snyder, a paper vendor, resulted in his arrest on a similar charge.

A full platoon of police were on duty to handle the crowd and were kept busy with the disturbance and the appearance of the militants as they attempted to enter Sixth street from Morrison, Alder, and Washington streets. After the arrests the large crowds of curiosity-seekers dispersed.
