

HIGH-BRED STOCK URGED FOR DAIRIES

Record-Breaking Crowd Hears
Speakers at Chehalis Ex-
tension School.

MILK MARKET IS DISCUSSED

Principle of Feeding Cattle to Get
Best Results Taken Up by
Expert From Experi-
mental Station.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—A record-breaking crowd attended the third day's session of the extension school conducted here today under State College direction and the auspices of the Citizens' Club of this city. Two hundred and fifty farmers, including wives, sons and daughters, were present to hear the speakers. The Pacific Coast Condensed Milk Company, of Chehalis, served a palatable luncheon in an adjoining hall. At 1 o'clock the boys' band from the Washington State Training School here gave a concert at the City Hall Park.

One of the principal speakers at this morning's session was P. J. Kenner, general superintendent of the Pacific Coast Condensed Milk company. He announced that, after long hesitancy, the company was now willing to buy milk from cows that were fed food from silos, on condition that the silage had been prepared and fed in a proper manner. The company's attitude in the past had been to discourage use of silo prepared food. Mr. Kenner reported that the company is today paying ten cents per hundred pounds more for milk than it did one year ago, although the price of butter fat is lower.

The former slump in the condensed milk market has become a thing of the past and the company is now anxious to get all the milk possible.

"Breeding Up the Dairy Herd" was the subject of a most interesting hour's talk by H. L. Blanchard, who told the dairymen present that they could well afford some 16 or 20 of them together, to pay as much as \$2000 for a high-bred sire of the most valued kind of whatever breed they might select, from some famous family of blood, under the community breeding plan.

The value of cows giving from 6000 pounds to 9000 pounds of 4 per cent milk was compared with figures that point was driven home to every cow milker present, that he should weed out the animals that do not come through with the amount of quality milk that will pay returns in dollars and cents at the end of the year.

W. A. Linklater, of Payulup Experimental Station, talked of "Principles of Feeding." He pointed out the values of the foods which had been tested in his department and showed wherein certain foods have been found better than others. His auditors asked questions that added greatly to the results of the meeting.

Mrs. H. D. Whitaker, the poultry expert, spoke at the afternoon session and at each of the section meetings. At the assembly room in the Public Library, Miss Sutherland began her series of lectures today on home economics, there being a large number of wives of farmers present, as well as many of the prominent club women of the city.

SON, DISINHERITED, SUES

WILL OF LATE DAVID DIGGINS
CONTESTED IN WALLAWA.

Thomas Diggins, Well-to-do Rancher,
Alleges Undue Influence Was
Brought Upon Aged Father.

ENTERPRISE, Or. Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Hearings on the contest over the will of David Diggins were begun at the Courthouse yesterday. Diggins died September 2, 1912, at Joseph. In March of 1912 he made a large number of wills, the bulk of his estate of upwards of \$20,000 to LeRoy G. Ialey, his stepson, the son of his second wife. Small sums were left for improvements at the Prairie Creek cemetery and an annuity was provided for the widow. To Thomas L. Diggins, his son, was left \$100, an equal amount being willed to his two children, the testator's grandchildren.

The contest has been brought by Thomas Diggins, a son, a well-to-do rancher and stock-raiser of Weston. He is here with his counsel.

At the time the will was made public it was stated that Diggins had passed over his son, because he had given him money years ago, and that with this start the son had become rich. Hence it was said, the testator concluded it was only fair that he give his stepson a start in life, too. Thomas Diggins says his father never gave him a dollar; that he made what he has without assistance from any one. He and his counsel contend that the will was made 90 years old, was subjected to undue influence when he made it, and is a chief beneficiary.

An interesting clause of the will provides that the principal of the estate be paid to him only if he prove himself to be "an industrious and a good citizen." Otherwise, the estate shall be held in trust and the net income paid to Ialey until he proves himself "worthy" to receive the principal.

The estate consists chiefly of mortgages on Wallawa County real estate.

'WETS' FILE SUIT

Restraint of Prohibition Petitioned at Salem.

ILLEGAL ELECTION CHARGE

Qualifications of Numerous Persons
Casting Votes in Local Option
Contest Questioned by Representative of Saloons.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—John Stillman, representing the saloon interests of Salem, today filed suit to restrain the county authorities from declaring prohibition to be in effect in the city as a result of the recent election in which the anti-saloon element won by a majority of almost 500 votes. It is declared by the plaintiff, who is represented by Attorneys Carson and Brown and McNary, Smith & Shields, that many of the signers of the petition for the local option election had not the qualifications of voters. It is further charged:

"That a pretended election was held in the City of Salem and adjacent territory on the fourth day of November, 1913, and the said election purported to be held pursuant to the provisions of the local option law, being chapter 1 of title XXXVII, Laws of Oregon."

It is declared that the judges polling the election were not appointed and qualified under the charter of the city, but were appointed by the County Court of Marion County, under the general election law of the state. It is further alleged that there was not held in this city November 4 any election for the purpose of electing any city officers or enacting any legislation pertaining to the city except the question of prohibition.

Allegation is made that a city election can be held only once the first day in December of each year. Further allegation is made that one of the voting precincts is beyond the corporate limits of the city and includes other territory and within its limits votes were cast by many persons not entitled to vote at city elections.

It also is charged that many persons who voted were not of legal age. Allegation is made that the judges and clerks counted the votes of 32 persons who were not entitled to vote and that they received and counted ballots from at least 166 persons who had not registered and who did not present affidavits proving their qualifications.

Several More to Testify for State in St. Helens Case — Husband of Murdered Woman Next.

ST. HELENS, Or., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Today's testimony in the Pender trial was somewhat of a nature. A review, John Riley was called again to the stand and testified that it was on September 17 when he notified Deputy Sheriff Grant that his car had been broken into, and then Sheriff Thompson, Deputy Sheriff Grant and ex-Sheriff Stevens, of Multnomah County, testified that it was on the tenth of the principal witness of the day was Guy Whitney, the clerk at the Wait & Price store at Scappoose, who testified that he handed the mail to Pender on Labor day and that Pender especially asked for the Wehrman mail. There are still several witnesses for the state, who are expected to give important testimony, the principal of whom are Detective Levings, Frank Wehrman, husband of the murdered woman, and the gun expert.
