

BIG TEAMS DRILLING FOR GRIDIRON FINAL

Coaches of East and Middle-Western Colleges Whipping Players Into Form.

NUMBER SYSTEM ADOPTED

Princeton and Cornell Battle With Imaginary Yale—Coach Staggs Is Believed to Have Something in Reserve for Gophers.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Drilled in defense until their tackling has improved noticeably, and coached in the art of advancing the ball to the best of their instructors' knowledge, the Chicago football players ended today the hardest part of their preparations for the game with Minnesota next Saturday—the battle that is to decide the conference championship.

All season, it is said, Coach Staggs has realized that the crucial game the Maroons must be that with the Gophers and planned his campaign for the championship accordingly. A defense calculated to block new variations of the "Minnesota shift" and other Minnesota plays has been developed, it is believed by the Maroon coach. It seems probable that the Chicago team is stronger than the games played so far this season would indicate. In each contest the team had something in reserve and Staggs was content with victories by small but safe margins without pushing his men to their utmost.

The defense has been the weak Maroon point and the drill in the last two weeks has been planned with the idea of correcting that fault. Special attention has been given to training the secondary defense to intercept forward passes.

John Vruwink, who was one of the star Chicago ends early in the season, but who was declared ineligible just before the Illinois game two weeks ago, has been dismissed from the university by the faculty for misrepresenting his eligibility status. Vruwink's friends declare he was unaware that his brief athletic career at Hope College, Michigan, rendered him ineligible.

OLD STAR PRACTICES AT YALE

Fierce Scrimmage Watched by 1000 Undergraduates and Alumni.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 12.—With more than 1000 undergraduates and alumni, Yale's football team had its final hard practice today before the Princeton game. The varsity lined up against the scrubs, and the scrubs scored a touchdown after a long run. Heffelfinger, '88, considered by many critics one of the greatest football players ever representing Yale, played on the scrubs and showed his old-time prowess by smashing through the varsity line and tackling the backs for losses.

Nearly all members of the '88 team, who are here for their 25th anniversary celebration, watched the practice and cheered the varsity. The practice was the fiercest they had seen in recent years, and several varsity men, including Captain Ketcham, were slightly hurt.

YALE-TACTICS TEAM DEFEATED

Harvard's First Squad Beats Men Mimicking Old Rival.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 12.—Yale's best formation proved unsuccessful today against Harvard's readjusted eleven, the crimson varsity repulsing every attack of the second team which was using Yale plays. A little puzzled at first by the Yale version of the Minnesota shift, the Harvard players analyzed the formation and never was at a loss to break it up.

This pretended battle with Yale was the first part of a long and arduous campaign. The afternoon ended with 20 minutes of practice against team B, the substitutes, in which Harvard, playing his new position at end, for the varsity, made the only touchdown.

TIGERS BEAT IMAGINARY YALE

Princeton's First Team Scores at Will Against Scrub Squad.

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 12.—The Princeton varsity foot team, using its regular attack beat the scrubs, using Yale formations, today by a score of 11 to 7.

Law succeeded in getting around right end for two runs, one for 20 yards and another for 40 yards, both of which were responsible for scores. Captain Baker added field goal from the 30-yard line. Gillespie relieved J. S. Baker at right end on the varsity for a short time and the only other substitution was that of F. Trenkman for Streit at fullback.

ODDS FAVOR NEBRASKA TEAM

Kansas Squad Is Practicing for Big Game—Seat Sale Heavy.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Nov. 12.—"Beat Nebraska" is the watchword at the University of Kansas this week. The Kansas football squad tried a fast practice today. The men appeared to be in fine fettle, although several regulars were missing from the lineup. The coaches said they expected all the regulars but Stuewe and Davis to be in the line-up Saturday against Nebraska. The odds on Saturday's game are 3 to 1 that Nebraska wins. The advance sale of seats indicates the biggest crowd that has watched a game here in recent years.

PLAYERS WILL BE NUMBERED

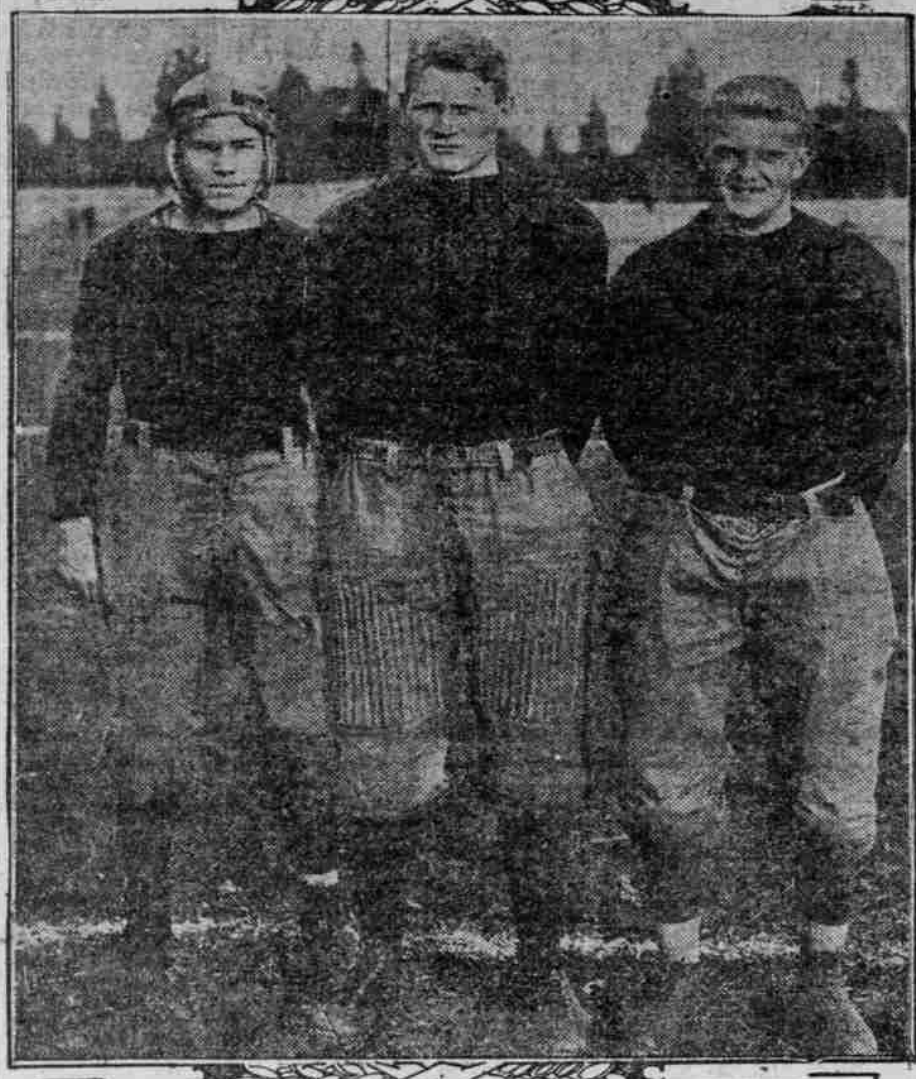
Large Numerals to Help Spectators Follow Game at Evanston.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Northwestern players in the Indiana game at Evanston next Saturday will be numbered. It was officially announced today. Large numerals on jerseys were made in accordance with the numbers in score books and it is believed that the spectators will be able more readily to follow the game.

The numbering plan follows a long campaign for it, conducted mainly by newspaper men, who declared reports of games frequently were made inaccurate by inability to distinguish players. An objection that the numbers would be of assistance to opponents in distinguishing the enemy's best players found little weight with the Northwestern officials.

BECKETT PICKED FOR END

Malarkey Bids Fair to Develop Into One of Oregon's Greatest Half-backs, While Oscar West Won Fame in Idaho Game.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Three Portland freshmen have carved their way to positions on Oregon's first team which meets the Aggies at Albany Saturday. They are John Beckett and Oscar West, from Washington High School, and Leo Malarkey, from Columbia University.

Besides the freshmen there are Cornell Parsons and Holden also hailing from Portland. Cornell and Parsons are former stars of the Washington High School, and Holden played a little with the Hill Military Academy. This makes a possibility of Portland having six men in the game with the University of Washington Saturday.

Beckett has been picked as Captain Bradshaw's running mate at left end. This is his first season on picket duty, for he played at fullback and in the line for Washington. Although injuries have handicapped the low-headed East Sider in every game this season, the coaches see in him a second "Weary" Chandler, owing to his weight and shiftness. Beckett's displacement is 184 pounds, his height six feet and his age 20 years.

Leo Malarkey bids fair to develop into one of Oregon's greatest half-backs. With Parsons on the infield list, he has proved the most dependable ground gainer in the games thus far. Malarkey is a sprinter, and his specialty is broken-field running, but he plays a strong defensive game. He is 20 years old, 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighs 151 pounds.

Oscar West had his chance in the games with Idaho and the Aggies, and made good. Until then a substitute, he was called on to fill Bradshaw's place at right end when the captain was transferred to Parsons' position at right half. West played through the Idaho game, winning his letter, and his smashing of interference was a feature. He probably will not start in Saturday's lineup, Cornell being the top card in case a vacancy at end occurs. West weighs only 146 pounds, is 5 feet 8 inches tall and 21 years old.

VARSITY BOYS WORKING HARD

Cornell Not Practicing, but Understudy Is Praised.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Forty minutes were spent by Coach Beckett's force in hard scrimmage practice last night. No let-up in the strenuousness which has marked Beckett's course of study all season is noticeable in the final week before the big game with Washington. Although still bruised from their interview with the Aggies, the players have developed no new ailments this week. Cornell is still absent from the varsity because of a sprained ankle, and many of the Oregon rooters were hoping to see him given a chance in the final moments of the game with O. A. C. when with the Oregon team crowding the Aggies to the goal line it is believed the Albany lad might have located the posts.

Fenton is certain to show better form in the coming game than in last Saturday's contest, for even with fearful marked the Multnomah game it will be Benton's last college football game, and the big fellow is expected to wind up his career with some pretty toe work, provided his teammates give him proper protection.

Interest in the big game has been intensified by the unsatisfactory draw with the Aggies, and 600 Oregon rooters will leave for Portland at noon Friday.

Austrian Studies Athletics.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Dr. Otto Herschmann, president of the Austrian Olympic committee, arrived here today

to study American athletics for the benefit of athletes in his own country. He was met at the pier by James E. Sullivan, secretary of the Amateur Athletic Union. Dr. Herschmann will visit athletic clubs in the larger cities of the country.

ASTORIA BEATS FOREST GROVE

Visitors on Defensive Throughout 5-to-0 Contest.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—In a game featured by the spectacular runs and plunges of the Astoria backs, the Astoria High School football team defeated the Forest Grove High School, 51 to 0 here today. The Astoria team scored 32 points during the first half and came back strong after the intermission, scoring 19 more. The Forest Grove boys were on the defensive during the entire game.

Both teams relied mainly on straight football. For the visitors Ireland's defensive playing was a redeeming quality. Antonich, Burns and Backlund were the best ground gainers for Astoria.

DOBBIE'S BOYS FAVORITES

RECORD-BREAKING CROWD EXPECTED AT SATURDAY'S GAME.

Oregon Manager Thinks Three and Four to One Offered on Washington Are Far Too High.

Despite Dobbie's bear walls and the warnings of a number of the close followers of football, betting opened briskly on the Washington-Oregon conference championship game yesterday and Washington ran favorite as high as three and four to one. Judged from the preliminary wagering and the talk around sport headquarters, the record crowd of 8000, which is expected to attend the Washington-Oregon game in 1913, will be exceeded. Dean Walker, manager at Oregon, returned yesterday from Eugene with the prediction that 10,000 fans will flock to the Multnomah amphitheater Saturday at 2:30 o'clock. Manager Walker thinks that 3-1 odds are too high. In his judgment 10-6 or 10-7 should properly rule.

Washington enjoyed such a walk-over against the Aggies, however, and the Aggies made such a brilliant showing against Oregon that the fans are convinced Dobbie has his sixth championship sewed and bottled.

According to Ralph Horr, Seattle graduate manager, close to 600 Washington students will be down aboard a special train Saturday morning. They are coming with the official "Washington hook" which will be carefully guarded by a contingent of 50 huskies.

The football squad leaves Seattle Friday morning and may work out on Multnomah Field later in the day. The officials will be George Varnell, of Spokane, referee; Dixie Fleeger, umpire, and Mr. Schildmiller, of Seattle, head linesman.

ATHLETES SAIL FOR AUSTRALIA

Four Americans Will Try to Win Honors in Antipodes.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12.—Four American athletes, representing the Amateur Athletic Union, sailed today for a tour of Australia, under the management of Eustace Pettochio, of San Francisco. They are: Powell, Boston Athletic Association, who will run the half mile, mile and two-mile distances; George Parker, Olympic Club, San Francisco, champion of the Pacific Coast, sprinter; Rurle Templeton, Olympic Club, hurdles, pole vault, high and broad jump; Reginald Caughey, Ukiah High School, hammer, shot, discus and javelin.

Caughey has won the Pacific Coast interscholastic championship for the last three years and last year won the National championship held at Chicago. Templeton is a Stanford student and the manager of the team, having heard that there was a plot on foot to kidnap him, in order that his services might not be lost to the university. While he is in Australia, he will be on board the Tahiti from a launch. He had been kept in seclusion since Sunday in a San Francisco hospital.

Old Grudges Expected to Add Zest to Boxing Tourney.

CLARK TO HAVE HARD TIME

Opening Session Will Introduce Walter Williams and Pedersen or McNeil—Northwest Out to Capture All Honors.

Beginning with tonight's preliminaries, the Pacific Coast championship boxing matches to be staged at Multnomah Club tonight and tomorrow, will offer a number of spirited battles following former close decisions.

It will be a regular "grudge-fest" starting with Walter Williams, of the Multnomah Club, and Pedersen, of Vancouver, or McNeil, of the Denver Club. Pedersen won a decision over Williams at the recent inter-club smoker at Vancouver, which chafed Williams not a little bit.

In case Williams misses Pedersen in the preliminaries he will meet Al McNeil, of the Beaver Club, Mike Butler's organization. McNeil is a local lad who has been keen for a go with Williams ever since the latter's rise to fame last winter.

Several champions of the Pacific and Northwest are to be on the slate and it will be the chance of a lifetime for the Northwesters to annex the entire Coast honors.

The boys are primed with that idea and Clarke, Los Angeles 145-pounder, possessor of that title, will have to oppose him. A dozen of the Northwest's best with the assurance that he will have to work to retain his honors. Fans are watching with interest the work of Malone of the Beaver Club, who will fight in the 125-pound class. Malone was the star of the Pendleton Round-Up meet when he ran through both the 125 and 135-pound classes without any trouble. However, with so many of the best boys of the Northwest and the Coast in the 125-pound class, Mike Butler has decided to prime his champion for this class only. An early start will mean several battles each night and trying both classes would be too much.

All of the visiting boxers arrived in the city yesterday and the Multnomah gymnasium was a busy place with the boys working out the stiffness incurred by the trip.

Chairman Edgar Frank announced the officials of the meet, yesterday. Olmsted Drago, the former 125-pound champion of the Coast, will referee. Joe Smith and J. N. Teal will act as judges. George Parker and Frank Watkins will do their "usual" stunt of holding the watches and Jack Latourrette will tell who's who among the boys.

GAME WARDENS EMBARRASSED

MAN SEEKS EUROPEAN CELL

Osborne Now Wants to Study Foreign Prisoners on Continent.

AUBURN, N. Y., Nov. 6.—Believing an examination of European penal institutions will afford him a broader outlook in criminology, Thomas Mott Osborne, millionaire philanthropist and head of the Prison Reform Commission of New York State, will sail within a fortnight for Europe.

Mr. Osborne, who recently served a self-inflicted term of one week in Auburn prison, will pass a term of similar length in at least one of the European penal institutions, providing permission can be obtained from the authorities there, for the purpose of comparing the prison conditions in New York State and abroad.

Mr. Osborne will visit London, Paris, Berlin, Brussels, The Hague and other European cities.
