SURVEYS ARE COMPLETED

Small Crew Remains at Clear Lake

to Make Readings.

EUGENE, Or., Dec. 17 .- (Special.)-Preliminary surveys for a transmission ine out from the projected power plant of the Oregon Electric Railway at Clear Lake, in the Cascades, 75 miles east of Eugene, has been completed down the McKenzle River to the western edge of the Cascade National Forest, and the crew of 11 men, under Engineer George S. Edmundstone, has been called to Portland.

A small crew has been left at Clear Lake to continue the reading of water level, rain, snow and other gauges to determine accurately the amount of water that will be available for the generation of power when the plants, which are estimated will develop 45,000-horsepower, are completed.
