Proposal for Seat Checks in Lifeboats Feature of Seamen's Safety Bill.

### CONFUSION IS PREDICTED

Preference to Women and Children Not Provided For, and Nothing Sald as to Fate of Those

Whose Boats Are Lost.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 .- "The unwritten law of the sea, sacred since man first braved the elements, that women and children snall receive first consideration in time of danger, is repudiated and eliminated by the La Follette seaman bill, defects of which have come to light daily."

Sex Is Disregarded.

"The bill sets forth," said Mr. Thorp. "the manner in which all passengers, men, women and children, regardless of sex, shall be assigned to lifeboat sents on boarding the ship.

"If complied with, this means that in the event of emergency men must take their allotted places regardless of how many women or children remained behind. What would be done with seat checks if one boat were crushed before launching?

"If Ignored, as it would be by almost every American man, whether he is a sailor or a John Jacob Astor, the provision would simply involve additional work and confusion in making the seat assignments. This would further needlessly complicate the boat management already made impossible by other provisions of the La Follette bill.
