Republican Leader Among Indorsers in Final Day of General Debate.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—General debate on the Chamberlain bill authorizing the President to construct Government railroads in Alaska was concluded today by the House.

More than two score members of the House made brief speeches for and against the project today.
