

CANCER ENDS LIFE IN SPITE OF RADIUM

Representative Bremner, of New Jersey, Succumbs in Maryland Sanitarium.

BATTLE BRAVELY FOUGHT

Election to Congress While Ill in Bed Is Tribute to Pluck of Patient.

Treatment Undertaken as Last Resort.

BALTIMORE, Feb. 5.—Robert Gunn Bremner, who won his election to the national House of Representatives from the Seventh New Jersey District after a career that was as varied, perhaps, as any ever sketched in the Congressional Record, died today. He had been suffering from cancer for four

years and came here last December to undergo radium treatment, although he was told there was not much hope of prolonging his life more than a few months.

He was 33 years old and married, but had no children. Funeral services will be held at Passaic, N. J., where the body was taken tonight.

Brave Fight Made.

He was born in the northernmost county on the mainland of Scotland. The heritage of bravery handed down by Mr. Bremner's forefathers from their battles with the sea, sustained him through many trying experiences as teacher, carpenter and electrician, soldier, reporter, editor, publisher and member of Congress. Mr. Bremner's election to Congress was accomplished while he lay in bed ill. He did not make a speech. The election is said to have been a tribute to his pluck.

Mr. Bremner was stricken with typhoid fever while a private in a New Jersey regiment in the Spanish-American War and was obliged to return home. He borrowed money, bought the Passaic Daily Herald when it was facing its end, and made it a profitable enterprise.

In the same spirit he fought his latest battle and physicians who attended him said that only his indomitable will kept him alive for many weeks.

Priest Asked to Assist at Funeral.

Representative Bremner's wife, three of his seven brothers and sister were at the bedside when the end came. The patient practically had been unconscious since Monday.

Among his last requests was that his brother Leith should take over the business of the Passaic Herald, of which he was owner as well as editor, and also that he should look after the interests of his wife. He likewise requested that Rev. Father Kiernan, pastor of a Catholic Church at Passaic, assist at his funeral. Mr. Bremner was not a Catholic, but he was warmly attached to Father Kiernan and they had been close friends for years.

GIRL OF AGE IS DIGGS' PLEA

Police Judge Inclined to Increase Bail of ex-State Architect.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 5.—Maury I. Diggs, ex-state architect; Walter Gilligan, his companion on New Year's eve and the following day, and Paul Spott, an Oakland plumber, will seek exoneration from the charge of criminal assault lodged against them by Ida Peering, who says she is only 17 years old, on the ground that the girl is 21.

That much was indicated in Police Court today, when the preliminary examination of the two was begun by counsel for the defense. That they are likely to have to appear in the Superior Court to prove themselves innocent was indicated by Police Judge Crist, when he said in response to a request to lower the bail: "I am more inclined to raise the bail. I am inclined to believe that there will be sufficient evidence to hold these men."

BELL'S TRAVEL PROTESTED

Philadelphia Daughters of Revolution Want Liberty Belle at Home.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 5.—Mrs. Cora Rogers Bleakley, president-general of the National Society of the Daughters of the Revolution, presented Mayor Blankenburg a petition today containing thousands of names protesting against the removal of the Liberty Bell from Independence Hall.

Mrs. Bleakley told the Mayor that among the signers were veterans of the Civil War, university residents, professors, bankers and editors. Mayor Blankenburg is not averse to sending the Liberty Bell to San Francisco, where it is to be the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, but the protests now being made, he said, should be directed at any future trip after the proposed journey to the Pacific Coast. Authority to send the bell to San Francisco rests with the city authorities.

Militant Held for Arson.

GLASGOW, Scotland, Feb. 5.—A suffragette, giving her name as "Rhoda Robinson," was arrested here today and taken to Dunblane, Perthshire, in connection with yesterday's incendiary

fires attributed to militants. The fire occurred at Abernethy Castle, the "House of Ross," and St. Fillan's mansion in that county.

PUBLISHER DEFENDS BOOK

Editors Called to Refute Charge of Corrupting Readers.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—The Federal District Court room today held a distinguished gathering of writers and editors attending the trial of Mitchell Kennerley, a publisher, charged with violating the postal laws by delivering to a purchaser through the mails a book that tended to "infect the minds and corrupt the morals of readers." Mr. Kennerley was indicted on complaint of Anthony Comstock, agent for the Society for the Suppression of Vice.

To persuade the jury that the book contained nothing detrimental to public morals the defense called as witnesses Norman Hapgood, editor of Harper's Weekly; Leonard Abbott, literary editor of Current Opinion; J. B. Kerfoot, literary editor of Life, and Jeremiah W. Jenks, a professor of sociology at Columbia University.

The prosecution contented itself with reading to the jury various passages of the book.

POLITICIAN GETS 6 MONTHS

Attack on Woman Election Judge Part of Family Quarrel.

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—Joseph McDonough, a ward leader, charged by his cousin, Miss Walsh, an election judge, with attacking her while she was pursuing her election duties, was sentenced today to six months in jail. He was released on bond and one week was given him in which to show he has the right of appeal.

Miss Walsh testified that she had entered McDonough's home attending her election duties and that in putting her out he handled her roughly. Relatives of both families testified there had been quarrels between the McDonough and Walsh branches for years and that Miss Walsh had been warned not to enter the home.

RUNAWAY GIRL TO RETURN

Lass Says She Flew Because She Did Not Want to Teach School.

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—Florence Lawlor, Brooklyn high school girl who disappeared from home Monday, talked with her parents over the telephone tonight and received their forgiveness for running away. She will remain a member of the Young Women's Christian Association here until tomorrow, when her uncle, Benson H. Hedges, of Columbus, O., and her father will arrive to return with her to Brooklyn.

Miss Lawlor, who is 15 years old, left her home, she said, because her parents wished her to enter normal school after she had finished high school. She did not want to be a school teacher, she said, but wished to enter a medical college and study to be a physician.

PRISON NURSES PARDONED

Two Rewarded for Caring for Convicts After Fire in Kansas.

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 5.—Doe Johnson and Theodore McKim, among the most widely-known convicts in the Kansas penitentiary, were pardoned by Governor Hodges in recognition of their services in caring for prisoners who were injured in the prison fire last year.

Johnson and McKim, who for several years terrorized Missouri River towns, were sentenced to the penitentiary for life in 1904 for killing Nicholas Bierick, of Atchison, Kan., while trying to rob him. Johnson is a surgeon, and while in prison performed more than 500 operations on other convicts.

M'ADOO WAITS ON BABY

Christening Delays Federal Reserve Bank Committee.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 5.—Because arrangements could not be completed today to christen baby Nona Martin, granddaughter of William G. McAdoo, Secretary of the Treasury, the departure of the Federal reserve organization committee was deferred until tomorrow.

The Secretary said he was not superstitious and the christening was set for tomorrow, after which Secretary McAdoo, with Secretary Houston, of the Department of Agriculture, will depart for El Paso, where the next hearing of bankers will be held.

BOILING WELLS SPIT SALT

Phenomenal Geysers Struck in Oil Fields of Roumania.

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Feb. 5.—Phenomenal geysers throwing up boiling water and steam heavily impregnated with salt have attracted numbers of geologists to the oil fields at Filipci de Tingu, in the Province of Prahova. The water issues from borings made in the search for oil.

BRYAN PEACE PACT SIGNED

Denmark and Portugal Accept Terms of Arbitration Treaty.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Secretary Bryan today signed a peace treaty with Denmark providing for the submission to a commission of all questions in dispute. The commission has a year to make its report.

A Secretary Bryan late today received word that a similar treaty with Portugal had been signed in Lisbon. Portugal makes ten countries with which such peace treaties have been signed. Three others are about ready to sign.

Kentucky Legislators Vaccinated.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 5.—Several members of the Kentucky Legislature and many residents of this city are nursing the arm today, the result of vaccination due to a smallpox scare which developed yesterday, when it was announced that Senator Porter and Representative Oliver were ill with the disease.

Havana to Allow Betting on Games.

HAVANA, Feb. 5.—General Freyre Andrade, Mayor of Havana, is about to issue a decree, it became known today, allowing free betting on baseball games. Public baseball wagers have not been permitted here since the occupation of Cuba by American troops.

GENESEE, Idaho, Feb. 5.—(Special.)—The local Farmers' Union are preparing for their annual banquet here on February 21. The committee is busy every day getting things ready. Several good speakers will attend this meeting.

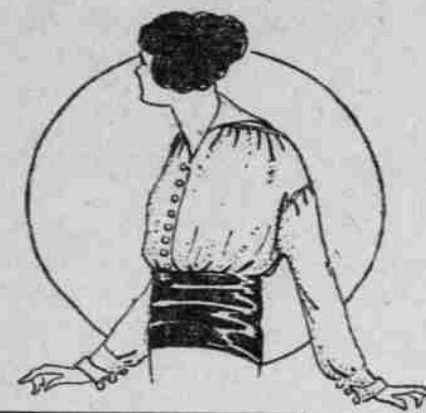
