

DIGGS AND GILLIGAN ARE HELD IN JAIL

Police Magistrate Refuses to Dismiss Charges of Miss Ida Pearing.

GIRL'S MOTHER TESTIFIES

Hotel Attaches Tell of Visit of Diggs and Lass to Hostelry New Year's Eve—Bonds of Accused Fixed at \$10,000.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Maurice L. Diggs and Walter J. Gilligan, accused by Miss Ida Pearing, were held to answer today to the Superior Court by Judge Wiley F. Crist, and their bonds fixed at \$10,000 or \$5000 cash.

This action on the part of the Police Magistrate was taken despite the plea of Attorney Nathan Coghlan that the case be dismissed through insufficient evidence.

Attorney Coghlan said that from the testimony obtained from various witnesses called to the stand today, there was nothing on which the court could justly hold the defendants. He also cited similar decisions of the Supreme Court. Judge Crist, however, refused to be guided by his plea.

Girl's Mother on Stand.
The first witness this morning was Mrs. Elizabeth Pearing, mother of the complainant. She was questioned at some length regarding her acquaintance with Diggs, to whom she said she was introduced by her daughter. She was questioned particularly regarding the names, ages and birthplaces of her children. In reply to a question she said that she could not remember the present whereabouts of the doctor or the nurse who attended her upon the birth of her daughter Ida, which she said occurred in San Jose.

After Mrs. Pearing, the remaining witnesses were employees of the Hotel Holland, all of whom testified at some length concerning the movements of Diggs, Gilligan and the Pearing girl on the night of December 31 and the morning of January 1. Many employees of the Holland Hotel were witnesses.

Two Rooms Engaged.
According to these witnesses, Diggs, Gilligan and the Pearing girl came into the Hotel Holland on New Year's eve and sat for some time in the lounge, or "pink" room, on the main floor. It appears that Gilligan, who was a regular guest at the hotel, and who occupied room 84, engaged and paid for room 102 on that night, saying that he wished to give his room to a friend and intended to occupy 102 himself.

The purpose of the defense evidently was to show by this testimony that Diggs and Gilligan had occupied room 102 and that Miss Pearing had slept in room 84.

Diggs and Gilligan were remanded into custody and lodged in jail pending the trial or release on bail. It is said that the trial will be held for both men tomorrow.

FINE CITRUS CROP READY

California Has Banner Year—General Outlook Promising.

CHICAGO, Feb. 9.—E. O. McCormick, vice-president of the Southern Pacific Railway, in an interview today at the Chicago Club, stated:

"I recently spent several days in the orange groves of Southern California. Growers estimate this season's shipments will amount to at least 40,000 cars of oranges. Weather conditions have been ideal and the fruit has matured perfectly. In fact, I have never tasted better oranges."

"Arrangements have been completed by the railroad to place the oranges in refrigerator cars, which will insure the delivery of ripe fruit in perfect condition."

"The recent rainfalls on the Pacific Slope, while unusually heavy, have been of immense benefit to orchards and agriculture in general. At no period in my knowledge of California has the outlook been so favorable for good crops and prosperous conditions for employer and employee."

BANK TO QUIT BUSINESS

Mississippi Institution Fears Proposed State Law Is Ruinous.

WINONA, Miss., Feb. 9.—"We wish to close up the Mississippi Savings Bank before the Legislature puts us all in the penitentiary, therefore we wish all depositors to come and draw their money. Wish all parties to come forward and pay us immediately."

This notice was sent today to all depositors of the bank by J. C. Burnell, the president. The Mississippi Legislature now has under consideration a banking bill, one of the features of which is the guarantee of the bank's assets. Burnell said heretofore his word was all that was necessary to insure confidence in the bank and that he would quit business before submitting to the proposed law.

GOVERNORS WILL CONFER

Secretary Lane Invites Discussion of Reclamation Work.

DENVER, Feb. 9.—Governor Ammons has received a communication from Franklin K. Lane, Secretary of the Interior, suggesting that a meeting of Governors of Western states and individuals interested in reclamation projects be held soon to discuss in detail the questions of irrigation and reclamation of arid lands of the West. Secretary Lane suggested that the meeting be held simultaneously with the Western Governors' Conference, which is to convene in Denver, probably in April.

In accordance with the Secretary's communication, Governor Ammons sent a statement today to Western Governors setting forth his idea of the conference and suggesting the second week in April as a suitable date.

ANNOUNCEMENT MARCH 1

Personnel of Federal Reserve Board Engages Wilson's Attention.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The personnel of the Federal Reserve Board to control the new currency system probably will be made known by March 1. President Wilson is centering his attention on a group of men and is looking into their qualifications.

NEW RECORD IS SET

Silas Christofferson Flies 306 Miles in Single Day.

MARK IS AMERICAN ONLY

Best Previous Aeroplane Flight on Distance Test in United States Less by 41 Miles Than That of Portland Birdman.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Feb. 9.—Silas Christofferson, the Portland, Or., aviator, flew from San Francisco to Lerdo, 12 miles north of Bakersfield, today. The distance, 306 miles, is the American record for distance in a single day's flight.

Christofferson will continue south tomorrow, en route to San Diego. Christofferson had hoped to reach San Diego today. The distance would have been 498 miles. By reaching Lerdo, 306 miles from his starting point, Christofferson exceeded the existing American single day's record of 265 miles by 41 miles. The 265-mile record was set by an Army aviator, who flew from San Diego to Pasadena and return.

How much of an achievement Christofferson's flight would be in the international record book would be judged from Sunday's dispatches, which report that Aviator Ingold, flying near Munich yesterday, was in the air 16 hours and 20 minutes continuously and covered 1050 miles.

Christofferson, flying 600 feet above the ground, passed over Tracy, 59 miles from San Francisco, at 11:55 A. M., according to a long-distance telephone message received here. He left San Francisco at 10:25 A. M. and was reported at Los Angeles, 117 miles south of San Francisco, at 1:16 P. M. He reached Fresno at 3:16 P. M.

NAVAL TUG FAST IN ICE

POTOMAC SHORT OF FUEL, POILED IN EFFORT TO AID FISHERMEN.

Snow Shuts Off View of Vessel Off Newfoundland Coast—Revenue Cutter Starts for Scene.

CURLING, N. F., Feb. 9.—The United States naval tug Potomac was sighted Saturday in an ice floe five miles west of Bay of Islands. Observation from shore has been prevented since that time by a snowstorm.

When the Potomac abandoned her attempt to liberate ice-bound fishing vessels, she was short of coal and was using her reserve supply.

PORTLAND, Me., Feb. 9.—The revenue cutter Androscoggin, with 200 tons of coal in her bunkers, prepared to sail tonight for Bay of Islands, N. F., to assist the ice-bound naval tug Potomac.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Feb. 9.—Shipping men here who are familiar with winter conditions of the southwest coast of Newfoundland expressed the greatest anxiety today for safety of the naval tug Potomac, which was last seen Saturday, dashing out of the Bay of Islands to avoid ice fields after an unsuccessful effort to rescue two imprisoned fishing schooners.

The ice fields of the Gulf of St. Lawrence at this season of the year are particularly menacing as the swift tides frequently cause them to crush together with great force.

The services of the Potomac were given by the Navy Department ten days ago at the request of Congressman A. P. Gardner, acting for local fish dealers.

IDLE AGITATOR TO BE BUSY

Judge Gives Unemployed Leader Days of Grace to Organize 'Army.'

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—Edward Teesdale, an agitator of the unemployed, who was ordered out of town by Judge Deasy, of the Police Court, and rearrested when he failed to obey, receives another period of grace today. Teesdale's attorney pleaded that his client would be so busy for the next few days organizing a band of unemployed who plan to march on Washington, D. C., that he would have no time to get into trouble with the police. Judge Deasy accepted the plea.

Teesdale wrote declamatory letters to President Wilson, printed copies of which he circulated, and to Judge McDaniel, of the Superior Court of Yuba County, who presided over the trial of Superior, in the Wheatland riots case.

WITNESS CHARGES ATTEMPT TO FRAME

Texan, Slayer of Wife's ex-Mate at Los Angeles, Sees Hope of Liberty Go.

MESSANGER BOY ACCUSER

Youth, Confused by Counsel for Defense on Stand, Retaliates by Telling of Alleged Plot, and Points Out Accused.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 9.—Roy L. Glover, land agent of San Antonio, Tex., charged with the murder of his wife's former husband, Daniel de Villiers, soldier of fortune and Boer War veteran, was held to answer to the Superior Court today at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing which ended abruptly after a witness charged that an attempt had been made to influence him.

Glover's attorney, apparently angered at the turn of affairs, declared no testimony would be offered in behalf of his client, and the land agent's hopes of being cleared on a plea of self-defense were snatched away. As they were when a coroner's jury failed to exonerate him some weeks ago. He was held for trial with his bond of \$15,000 standing.

The charge alleging an attempt to use influence was made by Charles Spielman, a messenger boy, who accompanied De Villiers to the home of his former wife here December 21 last, and who saw the scuffle which ensued between De Villiers and Glover when De Villiers tried to force his way into the house.

Spielman testified concerning the shots fired and the wounding of De Villiers, who died soon after on a sofa in the Glover residence. Spielman was subjected to a severe cross-examination and what the prosecution declared was an "unfair attempt to impeach him" was made by the land agent's attorney, who succeeded in confusing the messenger.

As Spielman stepped from the witness stand after he had been questioned for a considerable period, he cried out: "They tried to frame me! They tried to frame me!"

Messenger Boy Accuser.
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Summons in From Saloon.
Asked by the Police Judge who presided at the hearing what he meant, Spielman said that soon after De Villiers' death he had received a telephonic summons to a saloon and, responding, had been met by two men.

"They asked me what the District Attorney had ever done for me," said Spielman, "and what favors I expected to get from him. They said: 'De Villiers is dead. Glover is alive. What do you want to line up with the dead ones for?'"

"Then," said Spielman, pointing at a corpulent man in the courtroom, "one of the men who tried to frame me."

A commotion followed. The prosecutor said no immediate action would be taken against the men charged by Spielman of having tried to "frame him."

OLD CHARGES QUASHED

Man in Ohio Prison Will Not Be Released on Release.

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 9.—Upon completion of his sentence in the Ohio penitentiary on February 27, Joseph A. Hull, serving four years from Cuyahoga County, will not be arrested for return for trial in New York on a charge of raising a check bearing the signature of the late Timothy L. Woodruff, whose attorney was in the penitentiary.

E. F. Brown, of the Ohio Penitentiary Board, received a letter from District Attorney Charles S. Whitman, saying that the case against Hull, pending against Hull had been dismissed. Hull, it is said, desires to take up his home with his aged father in Montana.

His offense in this case was uttering a check upon a bank in which he was not a depositor.

DIVORCED WIFE INHERITS

Part of H. M. Flagler's Estate Goes to Insane Mate He Left.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—In return for releasing her dower rights in the estate of the late Henry M. Flagler, the Florida multi-millionaire, Ida A. Flagler, an incompetent whom Flagler divorced after she became insane, will receive \$65,233 in cash.

The Supreme Court authorized this arrangement today on the recommendation of Andrew Freedman, who has charge of Mrs. Flagler's property. The payment was calculated to equal 5 per cent a year on one-third of the value of the Flagler estate during the period that Mrs. Flagler, according to the life insurance tables, may continue to live.

FEW GRADE CHILDREN PASS

Vancouver Report Says Only 39 Out of 412 Are Successful.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Of the 412 taking the eighth grade examinations in this county only 39 passed, and five of these were from one school, at Hockinson. The highest score was made by Miss Helen Momen, who won 735 of a possible 800 points. Miss Helen Wineberg, daughter of J. P. Wineberg, was second, scoring 721 points.
