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and bake in well-greased, hissing hot muffin pans, or bake in a loaf if preferred. The bread will keep moist longer if the dates are cooked with the cornmeal and other ingredients (except the flour, baking powder and egg) in the double boiler. Baked in a loaf this is good for making nut sandwiches.

Steamed corn bread—Two cups yellow corn meal, one cup flour, 2½ cups sour milk, ½ teaspoon (level) soda, one teaspoon salt, one-half cup molasses. Sift the flour, soda and salt and stir in the cornmeal, mixing thoroughly. Add the molasses and sour milk. Pour into a well-greased mould, which should not be more than two-thirds full. A lard pail (with a well-fitting cover) is a good substitute for a mould. Cover closely and steam five hours. This is useful as a change from the usual Boston brown bread.

Corn meal and apple dumplings—Six tart apples, medium size; one teaspoon salt, two cups corn meal, boiling water. Add the salt to the meal and pour on enough boiling water to make a thick paste. Stir well and spread one inch thick on a pudding cloth or line a pudding mould or bowl with it. Put in the apples, pared and quartered, and cover with the meal paste. Tie up the cloth, or cover the mould, and boil or steam, as is preferred. Steaming is best. This is an old-fashioned dish served as an accompaniment to roast pork, where it takes the place of the more usual potatoes and apple sauce. For modern table service, individual moulds might be used.

The pudding may also be served as a dessert by adding sugar, bits of butter, and, if liked, a little cinnamon and nutmeg to the apples. Serve with cream or any preferred sweet pudding sauce.
