

CONSULS HUNT FOR MISSING AMERICAN

Villa Suggests Man May Be Among Rejected Recruits He Is Sending Home.

JUAREZ JAILS SEARCHED

Secretary Bryan Orders Report on Arrest or Reported Execution. Benton's Body Expected to Shed Light on Mystery.

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 22.—In a telegram to the American Consul at Juarez, Thomas D. Edwards, General Villa suggests that the American reported missing in Mexico may be included in a batch of American recruits which he says he has rejected and will send back to Juarez by the first troop train.

Villa's telegram says there are 15 of these Americans who wished to join his forces, but whom he has found unavailable. At present search is being made for Harry Compton, of Oakland, Cal.; Robert Lawrence, an Englishman, who came here recently to visit William S. Benton, who was killed by the rebels last Tuesday; a New Mexico ranchman named Curtis, said to have joined Lawrence in the search for Benton, and Gustav Baugh, officially reported to have been taken to Chihuahua for further investigation of the charge of being a spy.

Search Proves Fruitless. United States consular representatives at Juarez and Chihuahua have been searching for trace of Compton, but he is neither in the jails nor quarters, according to reports made to them by constitutionalist officials, who also say that they never had him under arrest.

A private message from W. E. Perry, of Garden City, Cal., asked for information concerning the missing man. It said a letter had been received from Harry Compton, dated Chihuahua, which appealed to them for assistance, saying he was a prisoner in the Chihuahua jail and was to be removed to Juarez on February 15, which was also the date set for his execution. He did not say in the letter on what charge he had been arrested.

Citizens Plead Mother's Cause. General Hugh L. Scott also received a request from citizens of Garden City, Cal., to assist in finding the man because of his broken-hearted mother, and the military have taken up the search. The message to General Scott said that a direct appeal had been made to President Wilson to take steps to have the constitutionalists give information concerning Compton.

Consul Edwards was instructed by Secretary of State Bryan today to locate Compton if possible or report on the alleged arrest and execution of the American. Similar instructions were telegraphed to Consul Letcher at Chihuahua to conduct an investigation there. Both consuls immediately took up the matter.

Richard M. Dudley telegraphed Senator Fall today asking him to take measures to obtain immediate delivery of the body of Benton to the widow on this side of the river. Mr. Dudley explained that he believed a view of the body would go far to explain the manner of the Scotchman's death. Dudley, like other Americans here, does not accept the official explanation of a court-martial as given out at Juarez yesterday.

WILL ACCUSE BENTON

CASE HINGES ON WHETHER BENTON CARRIED WEAPON.

Government Finds It Difficult to Take Issue in Absence of Evidence Justifying Action.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—President Wilson and Secretary Bryan conferred today on the Mexican situation. No announcements were made after the conference, but it is understood a complete report on the execution at Juarez of William S. Benton, the British subject, is awaited before the view of this government toward the incident is made known.

It is indicated that Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British Ambassador, has expressed to the British Foreign Office his pleasure at the promptness with which the American Government has acted in seeking to ferret the truth about the killing of a British subject.

It is generally admitted the case hinges largely on whether Benton went to General Villa's headquarters armed. That he was high-spirited and had previous difficulties with the constitutionalists is known, but on the fact whether he had a revolver when he executed Villa depends judgment of the affair. Benton's friends deny he carried weapons.

On the truth or falsity of Villa's statement that he tried to kill him will depend the view of the British and United States governments will take. The prevalent belief in official circles is that in the absence of satisfactory evidence to the contrary, it will be difficult for this government, at least, to reject Villa's version.

In the meantime the constitutionalist agency here is active in issuing telegrams from General Villa giving his defense for the killing. They are along the same lines as previous messages, and Villa asserts in one of them that he still has Benton's pistol. Other telegrams to the agency say Benton's record in Chihuahua was that of a quarrelsome man, and the charge is made that he was guilty of having maltreated peons on his ranch to the extent of taking their lives.

about the matter. I know nothing about Mr. West's plans now, except what I have read in the newspapers. "I do not know the object of the reported visit of Miss Hobbs, but if she comes to Cove I will give her every aid possible and I believe the City Council feels the same way."

Mrs. E. Anderson, the only woman member of the Cove City Council; Edward Forrester and Robert French, also members of the body, said the Mayor had voiced their sentiments.

"Personally," continued Mayor Wilson, "if the Governor thinks he can do anything to improve affairs at Cove, I will be right here to give every assistance and will appreciate his help as much as anyone possibly could."

PROSECUTOR EXPLAINS CASE Order to Close Cove Saloon Not Given as Required by Law.

LA GRANDE, Or., Feb. 22.—(Special.)—The normal situation of Cove, which town it is reported that Governor West is to clean up, is creating quite a little attention throughout the county. While the saloon which is run by Ernest Thorson is claimed by many to be running illegally, District Attorney Ivanhoe takes a different view. He says that moral conditions in Cove are bad and that he would be glad to close the saloon there if he could do so.

He says that at the last election, when Union County was voted wet, the precinct in which Cove is situated voted dry, that as provided by law the County Judge failed to declare the precinct dry territory within 15 days hence the precinct continued wet as it was before the county was voted dry.

Mr. Ivanhoe says that people from Cove have applied to him to close the saloon, saying that they have advice from attorneys that the saloon was running illegally. He says he told them that he would appoint him his deputy with full power to act in the matter. Mr. Ivanhoe says his proposition has not been accepted.

At the last city election in Cove three Councilmen were seated, each being against the saloon. County Judge Henry says he did not know, and does not at this time know, that to make the Cove precinct dry he should have declared it wet in 15 days after the election. He says he understands that when the county was a whole voted wet that it included all precincts whether or not they voted wet or dry.

Cove is a beautiful town surrounded by unsurpassed cherry and apple orchards. Mr. Thorson, who runs the saloon at Cove, has announced that he has a license from the town of Cove to operate a saloon and that, notwithstanding the fact that Miss Hobbs would arrive there tomorrow, he would open for business. He said he has no idea of what was in store for him.

holds of the federalists being at Tampico on the east, Monterey, Saltillo and Torreon on the south and Guaymas on the west and Nuevo Laredo and Piedras Negras on the north.

As suggesting that the revolutionary leaders may have to content themselves with their victories in the north, officials high in the rebel government point out that one reason for the overthrow of President Madero was that he represented the ideals of north at the seat of government in the south, where progress had not kept pace with the northern states.

That by delaying his attacks on

Torreon, General Villa has lost some of the prestige which he gained in the quick victory at Ojinaga is conceded here. A prompt assault on Torreon, after the Ojinaga victory six weeks ago, some rebel leaders say, would have given General Villa's troops great moral advantage in routing the federalists.

Instead the federalists in Torreon, under General Refugio Velasco, with ample train and telegraph communications with Mexico City, have had opportunities to fortify their position and to overcome much of the terror aroused among the federal soldiers by the mere mention of Villa's name.

SUNDAY BURGLAR CAUGHT

JOSEPH FELS PASSES ON

Joseph Fels was known in Oregon through his association with two single tax campaigns, in 1910 and 1912. In these campaigns approximately \$50,000 of the Fels fund was distributed in the form of cash prizes to the winners of the single tax campaign. Other local workers were A. D. Cridge, H. J. Parkison, H. D. Wagoner, G. M. Orton and W. J. Kelly, some of whom received compensation. W. G. Esselstun came from the East to assist in the Oregon campaign. Mr. Fels himself paid a visit to Oregon and lectured in support of land value taxation.

New Campaign Rumored. At a recent meeting of the Fels Fund Commission in Washington, D. C., it was intimated that another single tax campaign would be waged in Oregon in 1914 and that an appropriation would be made for that purpose, but local adherents of the measure issued denial of the report.

The Fels fund was established through the offer made by Mr. Fels that any duplicate of the contributions made by others for the purpose of securing the adoption of the single tax somewhere in the United States within five years should be estimated at about \$25,000 a year ought to be raised by contribution, and he annually gave that amount to the fund, although the contributions did not in any year exceed much more than half that amount.

The death of Joseph Fels is a great loss to the progressive movement throughout the world, said W. S. U'Ren over the telephone from Oregon City last night, when apprised of the death of his leader. "I do not know of any other one man who could die and leave as great a void."

Mr. U'Ren was asked if he thought the death of Mr. Fels would have any material effect on the single tax movement in this country. "The cause of single tax is too big to be affected by the death of one man," he replied. "In my opinion, the general campaign will not be checked, but will endure until the struggle is ended."

Special Tax Collector Urged. ASHLAND, Or., Feb. 22.—(Special.)—A proposition from an accounting expert to go over the county records and determine the amount of delinquent taxes due Ashland has been referred to the finance committee of the City Council, coupled with a recommendation that the expert also seek to recover unpaid taxes in behalf of the Ashland school district. The aggregate of delinquent municipal and school taxes would run into the thousands of dollars, it is said.

Many Bounties Claimed.

ASHLAND, Or., Feb. 22.—(Special.)—Up to February 15 the pelts of more than 200 predatory animals were presented to county officials by bounty claimants. Among the number were 15 cougars, 80 coyotes and 110 bobcats. These do not represent all the animals killed, for some of the hides presented do not conform to bounty requirements, and many are shipped without entering claims for reward.

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
