As security the bank has filed with Mr. Lewis ten \$500 Portland Improvement bonds. County funds to the amount of \$10,000 were deposited in the St. John's Institution last June, secured by bonds of the same nature, as were deposited as the new securities.

A counter claim of \$352.70 was disallowed by the court.

Trial, who was visiting in his mother, Mrs. James Ferguson, of 1449 East Sixth street North, praised the policeman in his account of the robbery. He said that he thought Collins saved his life.

JACOB COHEN NOT GUILTY.—On motion of Deputy District Attorney Collier and at the direction of Circuit Judge Kavanaugh, the jury yesterday returned a verdict of not guilty against Jacob Cohen, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. The indictment against Cohen was returned on the complaint of Jacob Glickman. The indictment was returned against Cohen because he did not believe the testimony himself and did not believe the jury could convict on it.

So far as known, the dog had not bitten any one since it developed the disease. Report from the State Health Office is that an average of one dog a day is dying from rabies in Portland and the neighboring towns.

DRY GOODS ASSOCIATION MAN TO VISIT.—F. Colburn Pinkham, secretary of the Oregon Dry Goods Association, is expected to reach Portland Monday on a visit connected with the business of the association. He will come to the Hotel Lowell and will be arranging to entertain Mr. Pinkham in a way that will cause him to remember his first visit to Portland.

GAMBLERS' FLEET GUILTY.—To compromise cases against 30 Chinese, arrested in two gambling raids a week ago, the dealers in both games went into Municipal Court yesterday, pleaded guilty and were fined \$250 each.

BRICK PAVING IS SOUGHT

St. Helens Men Try to Interest Local Officials in Project.

ATTORNEY IS JAILED

George Ludwig Klug Charged With Forgery.

MORTGAGE TROUBLE CAUSE

Names of 'T. C. Cleeton' and County Clerk Coffey Attached to Paper Alleged Valueless on Which \$400 Is Borrowed.

Charged with the forgery of the names of Circuit Judge Cleeton and County Clerk Coffey to a worthless mortgage, on which he borrowed \$400, George Ludwig Klug, an attorney with offices in the Flat building, was arrested late yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Ford and Harry Bulger, and locked in the County Jail. He was held last night in default of \$5000 cash bond or \$10,000 bond.

The fraudulent transaction was discovered yesterday when John Dudek brought the pretended mortgage to the Courthouse for investigation. The mortgage was signed by the estate of Charles Herman Herold, by Hulda Herold, administrator, which investigation proved a forgery. The name "T. C. Cleeton" by such a name having been filed for probate in Multnomah.

The certificate attached to the instrument was to the effect that the mortgage was received for record on October 8, 1913, at 9 o'clock, and had been recorded in book 472, at page 148, record of mortgages. The certificate was signed the name of J. B. Coffey, County Clerk, by T. C. Cleeton, deputy.

The note form which was a part of the pretended mortgage made to John Dudek was for \$400, payable in two years, with interest at 8 per cent. The alleged false instrument was supposed to mortgage a 5.05 acre tract out in the county as security for the payment of the \$400 which Dudek says he gave to Klug.

The complaint against Klug, on which the warrant for his arrest was issued, charges that the transaction occurred October 10, 1913. Search of the records at the Courthouse revealed that the pretended mortgage was false in many particulars. The name "T. C. Cleeton" intended, it is believed, to be that of Circuit Judge T. J. Cleeton, is signed to the instrument as one of the witnesses to the pretended mortgage. For the other required witness, Klug signed his own name.

No record of any Charles Herman Herold estate could be found among the probate records of the county, and county Clerk Coffey says he has never had a deputy named T. C. Cleeton.

MORE CARS ORDERED

STATE RAILWAY COMMISSION TO REQUIRE SIX-MINUTE SERVICE.

Portland Railway, Light & Power Company Given Seven Days to Begin Montavilla Change.

A six-minute car service between Gilean and Stark streets on East Eighth street was ordered by the State Railway Commission yesterday after hearing complaints from residents of that neighborhood that the present service was inadequate.

This frequency of service will be required only between 6:09 A. M. and 8:15 A. M., when there is an urgent need for service by persons going to work daily. The Commission ordered that this additional service be provided by extension of the Montavilla line over the affected tracks, by operation of trippers or by inauguration of shuttle service.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company is given seven days in which to provide the service.

More than a score of witnesses gave testimony as to the inadequacy of the present service. Mrs. Ellen S. Berry testified that on December 9 she waited 15 minutes for a car at East Eighth and Ash streets.

The Commission obtained from F. W. Hild, general manager for the company, the following statement: "The company aims to carry a 40 per cent overload in the morning and 50 per cent overload in the evening, this overload being 50 per cent in the morning and 50 per cent in the morning and evening, respectively."

FOUR DIVORCES GRANTED

Circuit Judges Recognize Desecration and Cruelty Charges.

Four divorces were granted yesterday by Circuit Judges, Judge Frank M. Calkins leading with two and Judges Hamilton and Bradshaw each granting one.

Mrs. Beulah Drury was granted a divorce from Francis R. Drury, to whom she was married in November, 1902, by Judge Bradshaw, on grounds of desertion. Mrs. Drury was allowed \$25 monthly alimony and \$25 for the care and custody of a minor daughter.

Judge Calkins granted divorces to Mrs. Addie Bethel from Frank M. Bethel, on grounds of cruelty and desertion, and to Mrs. Edna Dunn from Edward Dunn. Mrs. Bethel was allowed to resume her maiden name, Addie Usher. Judge Hamilton granted a decree to Mrs. Anna Fallis from B. L. Fallis, on grounds of desertion.

REAL ESTATE MEN LOSERS

Mrs. Rena Schiewe Gets \$2000 Verdict From Atchison & Allen.

Because bonds of the defunct Columbia River Orchard Company were traded to her at 90 cents on the \$1 for a house and lot in Evergreen Addition, Mrs. Rena Schiewe got a verdict for \$2000 in Circuit Judge McGinn's court yesterday against N. H. Atchison and W. B. Allen.

Mrs. Schiewe charged that she employed Atchison and Allen as agents to sell her lot, which she valued at \$2600. They represented to her, she alleged, that they had found a buyer who would trade her bonds in the orchard company, of a par value of \$2400 and give her \$250 cash for the place. This offer, she says, the real estate agents advised her to accept.

She brought suit through Attorneys Philpotts & Eubanks and George W. Guthrie for \$2350.

IDEAS ON FEE ARE VARIED

From \$1200 to \$7500 Declared Right Pay for Foreclosure.

A reasonable fee to allow Attorney A. E. Clark for bringing foreclosure proceedings for the county against B. M. Lombard on the old County Poor Farm property on the Canyon road, is one of the problems to be determined by Circuit Judge Bradshaw, before whom the case was heard. Attorney Clark asked for \$7500 for foreclosing on the property, for which Lombard agreed to pay \$119,500. Several of the leading attorneys of the city testified that the fee asked by Clark was not excessive. Others testified that \$1200 or \$3000 would be sufficient.

Though Bradshaw has taken the case under advisement and will make his decision after he has returned to the hills and had time for further consideration of the several intricate legal questions involved.

SLOVER WRIT ATTACKED

Motion Filed to Quash Order to Review ex-Captain's Case.

Motion to quash and annul the writ of review issued in the case of E. A. Slover, ex-captain of police discharged by Mayor Albee, against the Mayor, was filed yesterday by City Attorney LaRoche and Deputy Attorney.

The complaint does not set forth sufficient facts to sustain the writ, the petition alleges, and the act on Mayor Albee's part discharging Slover was not a judicial act, but purely of an administrative character, and not in excess of the statutory powers of the executive.

Further reasons cited in the motion for quashing the writ are that no substantial rights of the plaintiff have been injured.

HOSPITALS ARE ACCUSED

Police Say Attempt of Matt Aufman at Suicide Not Reported.

Police will investigate today the cause of the failure of two hospitals to report the attempted suicide of Matt Aufman, a saloonman. Aufman is recovering now in the County Hospital.

Mr. Aufman, who is more than 60 years old, recently went to Scappoose, and there he shot himself in the throat with a revolver.

He was brought to Portland and taken to St. Vincent's Hospital. After his recovery he was removed to Multnomah County Hospital. From neither of these institutions, the police say, have they received a report of the attempt, as the city ordinances require.

Mr. Aufman lives at 1904 Market street.

WEED RECORDS IN MIDDLE

City May Wipe Slate Clean of All Charges for Cutting.

For reasons which cannot be explained, the records in connection with the cutting of weeds on vacant property by the city last summer are in a muddle which may result in the city being unable to collect from property owners. Commissioner Dieck informed the City Council yesterday that the records are mixed up and that he is at a loss to know how to handle the situation.

It is said that property owners whose weeds were never cut by the city have been assessed for weed cutting, and other cases persons charged by the city when it is said they cut the weeds themselves. The muddle may result in the city wiping its records of all the assessments.

ROAD CHIEFS ARE WARDENS

Multnomah Officials Named to Look After Forest Fires.

Four Multnomah County road supervisors were appointed deputy fire wardens yesterday by the County Commission. The appointments were made by F. A. Elliott, State Forester. The new appointees are George H. Smith, O. F. Falkenberg, C. E. Bramhall and H. F. Hanson.

Last summer the expense of patrolling the county by special fire wardens was nearly \$500, of which amount the county has been called on to pay \$158.32. State Forester Elliott advised the Commissioners that this expense will be reduced more than one-half by the road supervisors being appointed wardens.

SHERIFF IN AUTO WRECK

Pursuit of Escaped Prisoners Interrupted by Accident.

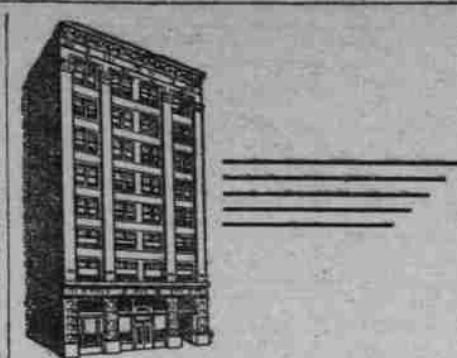

MAPS TO SHOW VALUES

ASSESSOR SOON TO ISSUE DATA ON DOWNTOWN PROPERTY.

Somers System Explained More Thoroughly at Conference, but Some Owners Disagree on Valuations.

Maps will be issued by Assessor Reed in a few days showing a tentative valuation on the front foot in the center of the four sides of every block in the district bounded by the Williams River, Stark, Tenth and Salmon streets. The valuations, as will be indicated, may be revised, before actual assessments are made, but will supply an approximate idea of the valuations on which the assessments will be based.

Though all owners interested did not agree with Assessor Reed and Walter E. Sweeting on the valuations they placed on the property in the downtown business district, a more thorough understanding of the operation of the Somers unit system of realty valuations was had by reason of a conference between property owners and representatives from the Assessor's office yesterday at the library.

Another aspect between the property owners and Mr. Reed and the Somers experts will be held next week, at which other valuations will be discussed.

FOUR FIRMS INCORPORATE

Investment, Furniture, Bindery and Fisheries Trade Represented.

Articles of incorporation of four small firms were filed yesterday in the County Clerk's office, the capital stock for the four firms totaling \$11,000. The largest of the four corporations was the Western Investment Company, capitalized for \$5000 and incorporated by John P. Whitlock, Grace E. Whitlock and George A. Sweeting.

The Grand Avenue Furniture Company, capitalized at \$4000, was incorporated by W. D. Jellison, P. A. Finley and Charles J. Schabel. The Pioneer Library Bindery, incorporated by F. Lincoln, Carl F. Brenne and Gunnar K. Carlson, and the United Fisheries, incorporated by J. A. Adams, D. H. Gieson and Oak Nelson, each are capitalized at \$1000.
