

GOETHALS ACCEPTS CIVIC FORUM ENDORSEMENT

Medal Is Presented to Canal Builder for "Distinguished Public Service."

OFFER OF JOB EXPLAINED

Mayor Mitchell Says if New York Legislature Does Duty, Colonel Will Become Police Commissioner of Gotham.

NEW YORK, March 5.—Colonel George W. Goethals, builder of the Panama Canal, received a medal last night from the Civic Forum for "distinguished public service," the first to be awarded by that institution.

Speeches were made by Mayor Mitchell, Rear-Admiral Robert E. Peary, Dudley Field Malone, Collector of the port of New York, Dr. St. Clair McKelway, Bishop David H. Greer, of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of New York, and Henry L. Stimson, ex-Secretary of War. A dedicatory poem was read by Percy Mackaye.

Tribe Paid to Subordinate. Carnegie Hall, where the medal took place, was filled to capacity. Colonel Goethals received an ovation when the presentation took place and in a brief speech thanked the forum and paid a tribute to his subordinates.

The speeches were highly laudatory of the canal builder. Mr. Stimson spoke of the fine spirit which Colonel Goethals had fostered among the 49,000 men under him, saying that the success of the undertaking was in a large measure due to this.

Goethals Ignores Offer. "It was not because Colonel Goethals was a great engineer that I asked him to become Police Commissioner," he said. "It is because he is a great administrator, and if the Legislature of the State of New York does its duty I know we will employ him."

Colonel Goethals in his speech made no reference to Mayor Mitchell's remarks, nor did he allude in any way to the New York Police Commissioner's offer. Colonel Goethals sat directly behind the Mayor when he made the statement referring to the canal builder in connection with New York City's police service and a great outburst of applause greeted what was regarded as the significant statement.

"SIAMESE TWINS" ARE TWO Delicate Operation, With Special Instruments, Brings Separation.

PARIS, March 5.—Madeleine-Suzanne, the French "Siamese twins," were separated today by a surgical operation of extreme delicacy. The operation was performed with especially constructed instruments by Dr. Gustave LePillatier, Dr. Rissacher and Dr. Victor de Launay and his wife, who is also a surgeon. Numerous other surgeons were present.

Five other members were sent to jail pending the furnishing of \$500 bond on a contempt charge for refusing to answer questions touching on the conduct of the lodge club.

LUNCH FOR 8 COSTS \$1.82 Society Folk at Newport Put "Limit" on Eating Expense.

NEWPORT, R. I., March 2.—"The Limit" has again come to the front as a diversion of the Winter colony. It is not, however, the last word in any conventional form of social entertainment, but merely an effort on the part of a

small group of women to study the duties of a household in the future to be better qualified for its management and at the same time to have the enjoyment of competition.

The limit is 25 cents for each person for a luncheon, and as the number of women invited is usually eight the luncheon positively must not cost more than \$2. A rule of the club is that receipted bills for all the articles used, even to salt and pepper, shall be shown to the guests.

WEST SIDE IS SERVED NORTHWESTERN ELECTRIC PRELIMINARY WORK COMPLETED.

Electric Light and Power at Reduced Rates Provided for City From Main Station in Pittcock Block.

Electric light and power service on the West Side was begun for the first time Wednesday by the Northwestern Electric Company from its main distributing station in the basement of the new Pittcock block.

The beginning of this service marks the practical completion of the extensive preliminary work, costing several million dollars, which the Northwestern Electric Company has been doing in Portland and vicinity in the last two years.

Power for the service comes from the big plant of the Northwestern Company on the White Salmon River, near Underwood, Wash. It is capable of generating 20,000 horsepower. Always ready for immediate shunting into service in case of emergency, however, is a steam auxiliary power plant in the basement of the Pittcock block. Should the White Salmon plant ever be in trouble, this auxiliary plant would be put into service so speedily that consumers would not know that a change had been made.

Generative Organs From Lifeless Bodies of Young Are Grafted on Older Ones.

TWO OPERATIONS SUCCESS

Surgeon, Unable to Find Subject to Make Test, Uses Self as Clinic, Woman of 59 Years Another.

CHICAGO, March 5.—Dr. Frank Lydston announced last night at the meeting of the Chicago Medical Association that he had successfully transplanted the generative glands of a dead person to the body of a living man. Dr. Lydston asserted that when he had been unable to find a subject willing to undergo the operation he had made the transplantation upon himself.

An operation performed January 16, he said, seemed successful, and the gland, taken from a young man 18 years old, who had been dead 17 hours, appeared to functionate like an innately gland. Dr. Lydston said if the operation proves a permanent success it may be a new remedy for Bright's disease, hardening of the arteries and ailments due to premature senility.

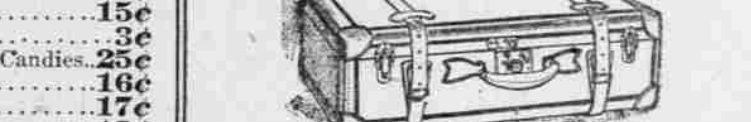
