see that they are entitled to full pay
from the city payroll which certifies
they have worked a certain number of
days. Pension Fund Pointed to.

"If a law providing for a pension fund and sick benefits has been passed, then pay for the days on which they were sick should come from the pension and benefit fund separate from the payroll. There has been no actual stopping of warrants, as the day on which salaries are paid is the 5th of the month, and by that time the matter will be adjusted."

Thirty-five policemen who were ill for periods ranging from one to 31 days last month lost an aggregate of \$600 in pay by the change which was ordered in the payroll of the police bureau. The policemen, in all lost 183 days, some of it checked by hours, or an average of \$17.13 each.
