LITTLE TAD WANTS BUTTER ON BREAD.

A deserted woman, who is trying to care for her three little children, one of whom, "Tiny Tim," is just recovering from pneumonia, was discovered a few days ago by the Associated Charities. CONDEMNATION SUIT STARTED.

Suit was filed yesterday by City Attorney George and Deputy Tomlinson against Jennie M. Griswold, George Wetherby and John W. Reddington to condemn 20 acres of land at Multnomah Falls, on the new Columbia River highway, for a public park. The complaint asserts that the city has offered \$500 for the tract which was refused by Wetherby who has started suit for title to the property which he claims under a lease and option taken from Miss Griswold. S. Benson has offered to deed the tract and land surrounding it to the city if the adjacent tract of land could be secured by the city as a public park.

MINISTERS INDORSE SUNDAY CLOSING.

A number of ministers of various denominations, represented by Rev. W. H. Fry and V. E. Wellings, are much in favor of the proposed ordinance now before the Council requiring all grocery stores to close Sundays. A letter asking that the ordinance be passed was received by Mayor Albion yesterday. It is probable that the body will come up for consideration by the Council next Monday at 3 o'clock the Ministerial Association will have met and adopted resolutions.

P. F. HAMPTON HOME ROBBED.

Report was made to the police yesterday of the robbery of the home of P. F. Hampton, at Hilldale, on Baird avenue, Sunday, of valuables worth several hundred dollars. While Mrs. Hampton was taking a music lesson at the home of a friend, two thieves entered the place and stole a diamond ring, set in platinum, worth \$150; an opal ring, a ring of turquoise and pearls, one of 2 carats and a lady's watch, a locket and chain and about \$5 in money.

JONATHAN C. HAMILTON DIES.

Jonathan C. Hamilton, an old resident died at the family residence, 392 Larabee street, Sunday, at the age of 75 years. He was the father of Miss Mary P. Hamilton, of the public schools, a member of the A. O. U. W. order and of the National Association of Stationary Engineers. The funeral will be held today from the family chapel, 414 East Alder street. Mr. Hamilton had been a resident of the state for 37 years.

MAN, 52 YEARS OLD, KIDS LIVE.

Sherburne Wilson, 52 years old, fearing the approach of death, shot himself fatally last Sunday night at his home, 752 Sauter Avenue, and died about midnight. Mr. Wilson leaves two married daughters and two sons. He had been living at the home of one of his daughters. The body was taken to an undertaking establishment and Coroner Slocum was notified yesterday morning.

WETHERBY ESTATE WORTH \$20,000.

Petition for his appointment as administrator of the estate of George Wetherby, was filed yesterday in county clerk George's office by John W. Johnston. The estate left by Mr. Wetherby, who died intestate April 11, 1914, is worth approximately \$20,150. No information of his heirs was given in the petition for the probate of the estate.

IRWIN SUTHER FINED \$100.

Irwin Suther, known as "Doc" Smith of Irwin, was fined \$100 yesterday by District Judge Bell for selling liquor to Hugh Dugan, after he had been notified by Mrs. Dugan and her son that he had no more. The case will be appealed to the Circuit Court, Attorney Sinnott announced after the fine had been imposed. Deputy District Attorney Ryan prosecuted the case.

MARKET MEETING IN ALBINA TONIGHT.

A public market meeting will be held tonight in the auditorium of the Albina Library, Knott street, between Union and Rodney avenue, under the auspices of the Albina Business Men's Club, to which all interested are invited. Address will be made by John P. Carroll, Dr. Pohl Lovejoy, Marshal Dana and others who will speak specially on the advantages of public markets in reducing the cost of living. Special attention will be called at this meeting to the public market which will be opened on Knott street, Albina, April 22. Full explanation will be given of the plans for this local market. The women of the district are taking a great interest in the movement, and are expected to attend. Grangers and farmers who can do so are invited to attend.

GRANGE HEARS ABOUT PUBLIC MARKET.

R. W. Gill, representing the Public Market Association and the Granges of Multnomah County, and M. H. Caley, secretary of the Albina Business Men's Club, spoke on public markets at a meeting of Woodlawn Grange Saturday night. Mr. Gill showed how the producers can be brought together and asked the cooperation of the public in the efforts to establish a market on the West Side about May 1. He told of the Albina market, which, he said, will be opened April 22 on Knott street. Mrs. C. W. Hayhurst spoke on the work of the Mothers' Congress. Mrs. Hyatt, lecturer, was in charge.

JURORS MAKE PLEA FOR MITCHELL.

Seven of the jurors who were discharged yesterday after disagreeing in the Mitchell murder case yesterday signed a petition requesting Judge Kavanaugh to dismiss the indictment against Mitchell, who has been tried twice for the shooting of George Morgan, near the corner of Burnside and Third streets last December. Each juror was unable to agree and was discharged. Two more of the jurors had promised Attorney Jeffrey and Williams to sign the petition and two of the three who stood out for manslaughter have intimated that they might sign the petition, the attorneys said yesterday.

FOURTH STREET TO BE CLEANED.

In a last effort to solve the problem of getting rid of the mud and tar in Fourth street Commissioner Dieck yesterday assigned a force of laborers to work continually. The wood block pavement laid in the street last December has been a serious problem for more than two months. In warm weather the tar comes to the surface and sticks to the shoes of people crossing. At such times sand is sprinkled over it. Rain falling on the sand creates a black mud. The best engineering advice in the city has been offered to do all that is possible to get the condition but to no avail so far.

CITY EMPLOYEES TO CAST LOTS.

City employees will draw lots this morning to see who goes to the ball game. The City Commission at a meeting yesterday considered the advisability of declaring a half holiday and decided that it would not be proper. However, they decided that only a sufficient number of employees shall be kept in each department to transact business. It has been left to the heads of the various divisions to say who shall go to the game and who shall not. In the majority of divisions this question will be settled by drawing lots or tossing coins.

Loveland, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church. All friends are cordially invited to attend.

SWINDLING CHARGES FILED.

Complaints that he defrauded the Benson, Washington, Carlton, Ansonia, Cornelius, Perkins and Oregon Hotels by worthless checks were filed against Oliver Posey, a salesman, 55 years old, yesterday. Posey was arrested by detectives Pat Moloney and Swennes last Sunday night. With Posey is held his wife, Elizabeth, 23 years old. No charges have been placed against her and her actions in Portland are being investigated. The checks alleged to have been passed by Posey range from \$25 to \$100 each, and total more than \$300.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY ASKED TO ENFORCE.

District Attorney Evans has received an invitation from Thomas D. Elliot to deliver an address at the Pacific Coast conference for next hygiene, which meets in San Francisco June 23-31. The California authorities have written to Mr. Evans several times for information regarding Oregon's new abatement law, which has been used successfully in waging war on vice. Mr. Evans said that he was not able to say now whether he could accept the invitation, because of the heavy criminal calendar.

UTILITY APPRAISER NOT CHOSEN.

Although a number of expert public service appraisers have applied for the position Commissioner Daly has not decided yet who he will appoint to make the appraisal of the property of the Portland Railway Light & Power Company for the city. He says he has a number of men in mind and probably will be able to select one within a short time. When the selection is made it will go before the Council for ratification after which the appraisal will commence.

COURTHOUSE CLAIM ALLOWED.

With the approval of Architect Whidden, the County Commissioners yesterday decided to allow the O. E. Heintz claim of \$15,250, less a penalty of \$1000 for delay in completing the steel framework of the east wing of the Courthouse. The final settlement of the Heintz claim has been pending for several months and full payment of the balance due will be authorized at once.

ANNEXATION SUIT PROPOSED.

The Lents Commercial Club wants it settled definitely whether or not that suburb is part of Portland. A meeting will be called for about April 29 to consider measures for instituting a suit to determine whether Lents is inside or outside the city. The question of hard surface for the Foster road will also be considered.

WILLIAM H. HUGHES DIES.

William H. Hughes, a retired steamboat man, died at his home, 54 Lexington avenue, Sellwood, Sunday, aged 83. He had lived in Oregon 29 years. He was a steamboat man in the South. A family service will be held at the Oregon City Baptist Church this afternoon.

TWO DIVORCES GRANTED.

Circuit Judge Cleton yesterday granted two default divorces, one for cruelty and one on grounds of desertion. Mrs. Elizabeth Ferguson was divorced from John Ferguson for desertion and Mrs. Ruth A. Love was granted a decree divorcing her from James A. Love on grounds of cruelty.

WILLIAM H. HUGHES FUNERAL SET.

The funeral services of the late William H. Hughes, who died at his home, 54 Lexington avenue, city, April 12, will be held from the Baptist Church, at Oregon City, Tuesday at 3 P. M., and interment made at Mountain View Cemetery at that place. He was born at Swansboro, Wales, September 2, 1830, and came to America at an early age. He came to Oregon in the early '70s, settling near Salem, where he lived until 1902, moving to Oregon City from there. In 1902 he came to Portland and lived here most of the time until his death. A widow, Kate Hughes, and seven children survive him.

SUBURBS BETTER LIGHTED.

Portland's suburbs are much brighter at night now than they were January 1 due to the activity of the street lighting department of the city. Announcement was made yesterday that since January 1 a total of 253 new arc lights have been installed in various parts of the suburbs. Mount Scott and other districts in the south and eastern parts of the city have received the greatest number of new lights although practically all districts have received some. Installation will continue as rapidly as a force of electricians can do the work.

JUNKDEALERS BECOME CITIZENS.

As a result of a new provision in the city license ordinance requiring all junk dealers to take the naturalization oath, Portland now has about 25 more naturalized junkmen than it had up to a short time ago. Taking application for licenses it has been found that fully half of the dealers have taken out their first papers within the last two or three weeks in anticipation of the new requirement.

NATURALIZATION EXAMS POSTPONED.

Because of the Federal statute which prohibits the naturalization of any foreigners within 30 days prior to a general election, there will be no naturalization examinations in Multnomah Circuit Court this month. Multnomah States Examiner Hazard announced yesterday. All applicants who would have been examined this month will be heard at the regular examinations which will be conducted May 29 and 30.

RAIN STOPS PAVING OPERATIONS.

Because of the rain paving throughout the city has been suspended for about a week and probably will remain so until good weather sets in. The Spring paving season opened about two weeks ago and contractors were able to get in a week's work. Work amounting to more than \$500,000 is in the hands of contractors and will be started as quickly as possible.
