

REED IS STANDARD

College Recognized by Federal Bureau of Education.

PRESIDENT FOSTER TOLD

Graduates of School May Now Receive Teachers' Certificates Without Passing Examinations.

Reed College has been made a standard of education by the United States Bureau of Education.

President Foster has just received the following letter from State Superintendent of Public Instruction J. A. Churchill:

"Today I received a communication from Commissioner E. P. Claxton, Washington, D. C., notifying me that Dr. K. C. Babcock, former specialist in higher education, had reported to him that Reed College should be considered a standard college within the terms of the Oregon law, and the ruling of the Oregon State Education Department.

I take pleasure in saying that in the future this department will consider Reed College a standard college and will be pleased to certificate her graduates who have completed the work there and who have done the 16 hours' work in education as certified by you."

The chief requirements of a standard college, as stated by the United States Bureau of Education are that the college must have at least \$250,000 endowment, six professors, one of whom shall be at the head of the department of education, a library of at least 5000 volumes, and entrance requirements that will admit students of a four-year high school course.

The work of the Bureau of Education has been that of collecting and publishing educational statistics. It has never been given authority by Congress to "standardize" colleges. However, the list of standardized colleges prepared by the bureau is recognized by the Oregon law and graduation from a standard college, provided the graduate has taken a certain amount of work in education, is made the basis for certification to teach in the high schools of the state without examinations.

There has been no standardization of Oregon colleges since Dr. Babcock visited Oregon three years ago or before Reed College began instruction. However, it is said Reed College has more than met all the requirements since the first year.

Some time ago Dr. Foster was notified by Mrs. Josephine Preston, Superintendent of Schools of the State of Washington, that Reed College graduates would receive, without examination, certificates to teach in the high schools of Washington. In the completion of one year of post-graduate work is also required.

BOND TEST IS PUSHED

JUDGE CLETON MAY HEAR SUIT FOR INJUNCTION TOMORROW.

Action is Brought to Obtain Ruling on State's Right to Construct Span Extending Across River.

If arrangements can be made, the injunction suit not contrary to the issuance of \$1,250,000 interstate bridge bonds by the County Commissioners will be heard by Circuit Judge Cleton tomorrow.

Demurrer to the complaint filed several days ago by Attorney E. E. Covert and J. P. Winter was filed yesterday by District Attorney Evans and Deputy Murphy, who are appearing for the County Commissioners, defendants in the suit.

The suit was brought at the instance of District Attorney Evans, who wanted a judicial ruling on the legislative act providing for the bridge. Boston attorneys engaged to pass on the legality of the bond issue were unable to approve it without having a court decision holding that an interstate bridge, touching in this state, comes within the statute providing for permanent roads of the state, and that the feature of the act that provides that the state shall pay the interest on the bonds is not contrary to the decisions which prohibit the transfer of a debt from one body of taxpayers to another.

In relating the suit, District Attorney Evans and Deputy Murphy will urge that the Legislature has absolute authority in arranging to construct an interstate bridge, and under that authority can delegate Multnomah County as its agent. The relation between the county and state, they will present to the court, is merely that of contractors, all title and control of the bridge passing to the state upon its completion.

STREET WORK IS OPPOSED

Suit Against City Attacks Proposed Willamette Road Improvement.

Proposed improvement of the Willamette boulevard through St. Johns, Innette boulevard through the intersection of Philadelphia avenue, was attacked yesterday in a suit filed in County Clerk Coffey's office, in which an injunction was asked restraining the city and W. Mason, contractor, from tearing up Philadelphia avenue at its intersection with the boulevard.

Several years ago Philadelphia avenue was improved by the city, the complaint states, and the Council recently has passed resolutions to improve the portion of the boulevard which is within the city limits. Objection to the proposed improvement has been made on the ground that the Council is powerless to do the work, as the city has not acquired the street.

PAVING PRICES ARE CUT

Mr. Dick Prepares New Schedule for Repair Work.

A standard schedule of prices for the repair of pavements has been prepared by City Commissioner Dick to replace the present schedule, which is considered high. The present price is \$5 for the first yard and \$1.70 for each additional yard. The new schedule as proposed is \$2.20 for each of the first eight yards; \$2.90 for each yard in a repair job having a total of from 8 to 20 yards; \$2.45 for from 20 to 40 yards; \$2.35 for from 40 to 80 yards; \$2.30 for from 80 to 100 yards; \$2.25 for from 100 to 150 yards; \$2.20 for all over 150 yards.

To hasten the completion of repair contracts provision is made for a penalty of 10 per cent for all work delayed 15 days or longer.
