SEWER RECOMMENDED ACCEPTED.—After a thorough examination of the East Sixty-third-street extension of the Stark-street trunk sewer, one of the largest sewers in the city, City Engineer Dater and City Commissioner Dieck have recommended its official acceptance by the City Council. The sewer is nearly a mile and a half in length and is seven feet in diameter. In inspecting it city officials walked through the mammoth tunnel nearly all of one day. It is constructed of concrete.

AUDITORIUM IS IN MIX CITY COMMISSION REJECTS PREVIOUSLY ACCEPTED PLANS. Mayor and Members Prefer \$16,000 Damage Suit Rather Than Attempt Erection With Sums Available. Either the firm of Freedlander & Seymour, architects of New York, will draw complete new plans for Portland's proposed public auditorium, and without additional cost, or the city will bring suit against the city to collect \$16,000, alleged to be due for the original plans thrown out by the City Commission yesterday. The size of the proposed building site was reduced, and it was also found that the building, as planned, would cost about \$200,000 more than the amount available. These were the reasons given for rejecting the original plans.
