CITY COMMISSION REJECTS PRE-VIOUSLY ACCEPTED PLANS.

Mayor and Members Prefer \$16,000 Damage Suit Rather Than Attempt Erection With Sums Available.

Either the firm of Freedlander & Seymour, architects, of New York, will draw complete new plans for Portland's proposed public auditorium, and without additional cost, or will have to bring suit against the city to collect \$16,000, alleged to be due for the original plans thrown out by the City Commission yesterday. The size of the proposed building site was reduced, and it was also found that the building, as planned, would cost about \$200,000 more than the amount available. These were the reasons given for refecting the reasons given for rejecting the

At a special meeting of the Commission yesterday in Mayor Albes's offices the proposition was thoroughly gone into and the above procedure decided upon. In the event that the firm refuses to comply with the city's de-mand for new plans the city will cancel the whole transaction with the New York architects and hold a new com-petition for plans. Every effort will

It was shown at the meeting yester day that, in the rules governing the plans competition, the architects were to design only a \$450,000 building. The to design only a \$450,000 building. The rules are a part of the contract. Instead of designing such a building, it is shown by the figures of the Brayton Engineering Company that the structure planned by Freedlander & Seymour would cost \$745,030 to build, and, including architects' fee, would cost about \$800,000, an excess of \$350,000 over the specified amount. This was held to be a violation of the contest and the contract.

On the other hand, the jury of awards took the cost feature into consideration and decided that the building as designed could be erected for \$450,000 Accordingly, they awarded the prize to Freedlander & Seymour and the action was accepted by the old auditorium commission. Just how far the city can go in setting aside this action is uncer-

Not until the last six weeks has the city been in a position to estimate the probable cost of the structure, as the working plans had not been received from the architects. As soon as they were received Commissioner Brewster referred them to the Brayton Engineering Company for an estimate.

A letter will be drafted by Mr. Brewster and City Attorney LaRoche informing the architects that their plans will have to be redrafted. The original drawings were for a site a block and a half in size. The new ones will be for a single block. If the firm is willing to redraft its plans there is a likelihood that the city will be willing to pay something for the extra work. If not the firm will be obliged to sue.

The total fee was to be 7 per cent of \$450,000. One-fifth of this was to be paid upon completion of the first plans and two-fifths upon completion of the working plans.
