

ARCHBISHOP'S LOTS COUGH SCHOOL SITE

Stormy Scenes Follow Three-
to-Two Vote of Board to
Purchase.

12 PIECES COST \$142,000

East Frontage, Shrub Growth, Better
Environments and Streetcar Dangers
Pitted Against West Front-
age of "Block 11."

Hot words followed the majority vote of the School Board Tuesday to purchase, as the location for the new Cough School, the property owned by Archbishop Christie, on Gilsan, Nineteenth and Hoyt streets. The property includes over 12 lots, 310 by 200 feet in dimension. The price to be paid is \$142,000.

A number of the patrons of the Cough School district were present at the meeting and all of those who spoke argued against the selection of the property chosen. Toward the close of the meeting the feeling became so partisan that Chairman Sabina admonished the audience to "cut out the applause, as serious business was before the meeting."

"The opinion of all the people in the Cough district is that the archbishop's property is undesirable for the location of a school," said W. A. Holt, "the carline running along the Gilsan-street side of the building would not only endanger the life and limb of the school children, but serve as a serious hindrance to the teachers and pupils in their work. The property bounded by Twentieth, Irving, Gilsan, Hoyt and Hoyt streets, known as block 11, is strongly favored by the patrons of this school."

The remarks of Mr. Holt were endorsed by Sig Sichel, Dr. E. F. Tucker, H. Daniel, E. C. Heckbert, Charles Warren and Mrs. E. Haberman, vice-president of the Parent-Teacher Association of the Cough School.

Dr. Sommer Makes Motion.
Dr. E. A. Sommer moved the purchase of the archbishop's property and was endorsed by Directors Munly and Beach, giving that property a majority vote.

Mr. Beach explained his vote by pointing out an east as one of the advantages rather than a west frontage in favor of the property chosen, as well as a valuable growth of shrubs which might be retained, and the generally superior outlook in surroundings. He granted the objection to the carline, but pointed out that the other site under consideration was on partly filled ground and that a considerable higher price was asked for it.

"So far as accident liability is concerned," said Dr. Sommer, "statistics show that only three children in all the city have been killed by streetcars in five years."

Director Munly said that he proposed to place the playgrounds of the building on the roof instead of along the streets, where the children might be liable to accident.

Director Plummer and Chairman Sabina expressed themselves in favor of the property offered by the Columbia Trust Company, block 11, giving the location of the streetcar tracks as the principal reason for their views.

"The motto of safety first and effort in that direction should be encouraged," said Mr. Sabina.

When the vote of three to two in favor of the Nineteenth and Gilsan site was announced those who had formerly spoken in protest against that site rose to their feet and a mob scene that mildly resembled a Roman mob scene.

"Ignored," Cries Mr. Holt.
"We people, who pay the taxes in that district, feel that we have been absolutely and unjustly ignored," declared Mr. Holt. "And this is a place and an age when the people finally rise."

Mr. Warren said: "Give the residents of the district a chance to make a recommendation between the two sites and I pledge you that the expression would be unanimous for block 11."

The demand that the decision of the Board be postponed for several days, to give the patrons of the district opportunity to express which of the locations they preferred, was not recognized by the Board.

As these demands and threats were thrown back and forth, Dr. Sommer faced the crowd, shouting dramatically that they had picked the audience and that as many persons as those present had called him by telephone, urging the selection of the site chosen.

O. L. Ferris, president of the Columbia Trust Company, which offered Block 11, and Edward J. Condon, of the Security Development Company, also entered into a spirited discussion, which lasted several minutes after the regular adjournment of the meeting.

ORGANIZED SUPPORT IS AIM
Alaska Steamship Line Move Made by Rotary Club.

Support of the Alaskan steamship line by all of the commercial bodies of Portland through a joint committee is the plan that was launched through adoption of a special resolution at the Rotary Club Tuesday. This resolution, which will be sent to every Rotary Club committee to every club in Portland which takes an interest in matters of community importance, follows:

Resolved: That the Rotary Club requests each of the other associations of the city to have a committee, clothed with proper authority, to meet and work in harmony with the committee from this club, forming the consolidated Alaska committee, which shall represent all of the commercial interests of Portland. This committee shall formulate and direct a comprehensive campaign for the furtherance of trade with Alaska.

As soon as the message can be acted upon by other clubs and the necessary committees appointed, the Rotary Club committee will be effected.

SCHOOL COST PROBE ON
Holdover Senators' Systematic Inquiries to Cover Wide Range.

In accordance with Senate resolution No. 53, passed at the last session of the Legislature, steps were begun Monday night by committee of holdover Senators to fully investigate the school book system of Multnomah County, particularly of Portland, as to the number of books used, the number of times they are changed and any needed

revisions in the system. The committee is composed of T. N. Day, chairman; G. C. Moser, R. S. Farrell and Dr. T. L. Perkins.

It was decided to subdivide the work of gathering statistics and information. Chairman Day appointed Senator Perkins to gather cost statistics of the public schools, covering a period of years, from the principal cities of the United States, showing salaries paid, tax rates, cost per pupil and study courses pursued.

Senator Moser is to investigate the question as to time and manner of holding school elections in other cities, methods of raising and expending revenues and the drafting and preparation of proposed amendments to school laws.

It will be the duty of Senators Farrell and Day to arrange for public hearings, at which citizens interested in educational matters will be invited to co-operate with the committee in consideration and adoption of proposed changes in the school laws.

The committee announced that in these hearings it would especially desire the attendance and advice of the School Superintendent, principals of the public schools, governing officers of the various private schools, president of Reed College, officers of the Grade Teachers' Association and members of the Oregon Civic League.

Y.M.C.A. MAKES STRIDES

GAIN IN MEMBERSHIP IN YEAR RUNS INTO HUNDREDS.

Every Department Reports Increase in Active Enrollment or Attendance, in Some Cases Double.

Greater membership than last year was reported by every department of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association yesterday afternoon. The total membership on April 1 was 5489, compared with 5193 on the corresponding date a year ago. The directors decided to continue work under the financial budget adopted the first of the year, but to hold expenses to the lowest possible figure consistent with the gratifying results now being accomplished.

In the religious and social work department a gain from 17,799 to 18,940 was shown in the total attendance at all gatherings held during the quarter. The record for last month was particularly favorable, showing a large increase in the number attending religious meetings and in the enrollment in committee and social work and in Bible study classes. This gain covered every department of the religious and social work.

The gymnasium report was no less favorable. During the month of March there was an attendance of 4165 persons at the gymnasium classes, compared with 3068 for the corresponding month a year ago. The record of the business men's classes was especially good. The attendance in these classes was 1572, almost double the attendance during March, 1913. The number participating in swimming, boxing and wrestling was also larger.

The boys' department added to the uniform good showing. A gain in membership of from 993 to 734 was reported by the juniors. It was announced that the boys' launch will make 35 trips this summer, carrying more than 600 boys on the outings.

The enrollment in the educational department is almost exactly the same as last year. In many of the most important courses, however, the enrollment is larger. The employment department reported 4476 interviews granted and 360 positions filled during the past quarter.

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NEW CURE IS CLAIMED

DR. HENDERSON, ASTORIA, TELLS OF TUBERCULOSIS GERMICIDE.

Ninety-five Per Cent of Cases Not Beyond Ambulatory Stage Made Well. He Says, and Remedy Harmless.

The discovery of a tuberculosis germicide, said to cure 95 per cent of all cases of tuberculosis in which the sufferers have not passed the ambulatory stage—that is, when they are still able to be out of bed and walk around—was announced Tuesday by Dr. H. L. Henderson, of Astoria. Dr. Henderson is a member of the Oregon State Board of Medical Examiners. The announcement was made at the request of Dr. Harry F. McKay, of Portland, also a member of the State Board of Medical Examiners.

The preparation, Dr. Henderson says, consists of a mixture of from 100 to 140 grains of salicylic acid and from 40 to 60 minims of guaiacum. This preparation is injected into a vein with an instrument resembling a hypodermic needle.

Dr. Henderson says that the remedy has been tried on more than 1400 patients. In 95 per cent of the cases that had not passed the ambulatory stage, he says, the remedy proved successful. Dr. Henderson says that he has personally treated 12 cases of tuberculosis with complete success.

"The first effect of the treatment," said Dr. Henderson, "is a light chill followed by a sweat, with an irritation of the stomach, a tendency to vomit, and headache."

"In about 24 hours the sweat disappears, the temperature becomes normal, the stomach recovers its tone, and the cough and expectoration are greatly lessened. Then I administer tonics, iron, strychnia, etc., and give the patient the richest food obtainable, eggs, cream, etc."

"About ten days later I repeat the injection. He has then a ravenous appetite. In about 30 days I give the third dose. From three to six treatments are generally sufficient. The patient should recover in about six months."

Dr. Henderson says the medicine is harmless and applicable to all forms of tuberculosis except tuberculosis of the throat.

AUTO IS HURLED 40 FEET
A. J. Colvin Escapes Crash With Minor Lacerations; Other Cars Hit.

Two automobile accidents occurred Tuesday night, the more serious one at 8 o'clock, when A. J. Colvin, 336 Wasco street, was run down in his car by an Irvington trolley at East Fifteenth and Clatsop streets. The collision was so violent that the machine was hurled 40 feet and overturned, completely wrecking it. Mr. Colvin escaped with minor lacerations and bruises.

The second accident occurred when an Oregon taxicab, driven by Dan Maxwell, was struck by a machine driven by N. P. Sorensen, 1031 Quimby street, at the intersection of Broadway and Burnside street. Sorensen, who was driving west on Burnside, struck the taxi, which was eastbound on Broadway. The taxicab was badly damaged. No one was injured.

TOUR CHAPERONE CHOSEN
Mrs. David Campbell Named Guardian for Festival de Luxe Trip.

Mrs. David Campbell, widow of the late chief of the Portland fire department, is the unanimous selection of the executive committee of the Rose Festival as the official chaperone for the festival queen and her maids of honor on their tour de luxe.

The decision was announced at the meeting of the board of governors last night. Mrs. Campbell was endorsed by clubs, societies, organizations, business houses, public officials and citizens.

Though the date for the tour has not been definitely set, it is said it will be between May 25 and 29, in order to give the party at least a ten days' tour before the festival opens.

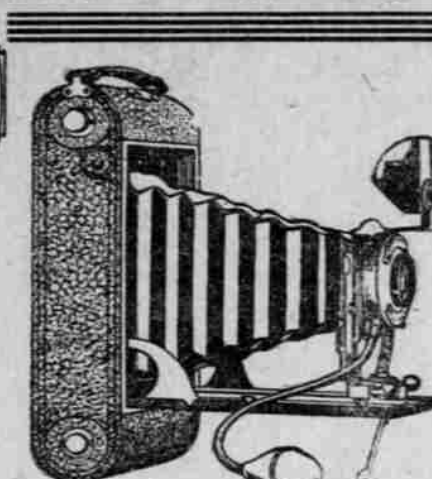
