

Park to Be Reached.

The next day the hikers will proceed to the snout of Carbon Glacier, where the Carbon River flows from beneath the ice. From here the route for the next mile is over the glacier itself. Then begins the final five miles, a climb of 3000 feet into Moraine Park.

From this camp Mount Rainier will e climbed, parties will visit Spray Park and Spray Falls, 800 feet high. The Elysian Fields, Grand Park and Summerland will be visited in turn. Many other shorter trips will be made.

Many other shorter trips will be made. The climb of the mountain will re-quire a bivouc camp at Steamboat Prow. From Moraine Park the party will proceed in a northwesterly direc-tion to the Windthrope Glacier, which will be crossed. Leaving this glacier by way of St. Elmo Pass, the party will cross the ridge to the Inter Glacier, which will then be crossed to reach Steamboat Prow, the site of the tem-porary camp. porary camp.

Ascent to Take Nine to 12 Hours.

The next day the climb over the Em-mons Glacier to the summit will be made. The ascent should take nine to hours, the descent four to six hours, possible the return to Moraine Park

If possible the return to Moraine Park will be made in the evening. On Au-gust 14 the party will leave and re-turn to Tacoma by the same route used on the trip in. Tacoma will be reached on the return of August 15. H. H. Prouty, president of the Ma-zamas, and a small party of climbers will pass the two weeks previous to the climb fit exploring in the vicility. 
