Rehearing on Approach Is Up to Governor West.

HYLAND TENDER IS HELD

Investigation of Commission's Records Is Being Made by Grand Jury and Engineers Are Summoned to Appear.

If further action is taken by the Oregon members of the Interstate Bridge Commission in the matter of the selection of an Oregon approach to the Columbia River bridge, it must be on the initiative of Governor West, the County Commissioners announced yes-terday. As ex-officio chairman of the Oragon members of the joint commis-sion, if a rehearing is to be had, it must be at the call of Governor West.

An offer from George M. Hyland, representing Peninsular and North Portland interests, to construct the Derby street approach to the bridge for \$224,464 was referred to the Governor, If he calls a meeting of the board, the offer of Mr. Hyland will be considered and a re-hearing of the location question had.

is represented by Mr. Hyland that It is represented by Mr. Hyland that the Derby street approach can be built for approximately \$50,000 less than Waddell & Harrington's estimate of the cost of the Union avenue approach. For the sum named in the proposition made by Mr. Hyland, he agrees to build the approach from the focal point on the south side of the Oregon slough located by the chosen engineers, to the connection with Derby street near Argyle street.

Investigation of interstate bridge affairs by the grand jury is still under way, though the nature of their inquiries have been kept a secret. E. E. Howard, local representative of Waddell & Harrington, has been called before the jury and questioned, the records of the interstate bridge commission have been called for and it is reported that estimates of the cost of various approaches as made by local engineers working under the direction of George M.
