

BINGHAM TO HEAD PERU EXPEDITION

Two Years Will Be Devoted to Study of Incas and Making of Charts.

RUINS TO BE EXPLORED

From Scientific and Anthropologic Standpoints District Is Said to Be One of Most Fruitful and Least Known in Andes.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Announcement of a second expedition to explore Peru, the ancient home of the Incas, under the auspices of the National Geographic Society and Yale University, to start next week, has been made at the offices of the National Geographic Society here. The director of the expedition will be Hiram Bingham, of Yale University, who, at the head of the 1912 expedition, uncovered the ancient fortress city of Machu Picchu, the most remarkable group of buildings discovered in South America since the conquest of Peru nearly 400 years ago. Two years will be given to the work of the new expedition.

The object of this expedition, according to Gilbert H. Grosvenor, director and editor of the society, is to make a geographical reconnaissance of a portion of Southern Peru, including the Cordillera Vilcabamba, and some portions of the Apurimac and Urubamba watersheds. This region is a part of the eastern edge of the great Andean Plateau. The Cordillera Vilcabamba is a chain of dissected mountains rising 16,000 to 20,000 feet above sea level, situated between south latitudes 12 and 14. Their bases are clothed with tropical jungles, while the summits are mantled with snow and glaciers. In the main they are unexplored. As one of the most inaccessible parts of the Andes, they have been occupied from time to time by the ancient peoples of Peru. In this region are the ruins of Machu Picchu, Palcay and Choquequirau.

Other Ruins Reported.

The reported presence of other ruins and the actual existence of some that have been seen but not studied or mapped make the region a particularly attractive area in which to study the problem of man's origin and distribution in South America.

The character of the land formations in the neighborhood of the ruins should enable something to be said in regard to the number of people formerly occupying the region, the causes of the location of the cities, buildings and forts and the reasons for their final abandonment, according to Professor Bingham. "An examination of the ruins, studies of the styles of architecture and of the artifacts and other remains that may be found fairly on the surface of the ground, should eventually enable a classification to be made, which, in connection with biological, physiographic, linguistic and historical studies, ought to result finally in unravelling the puzzle of the ancient civilization of South America," he says. "From the standpoint of biology this area is believed to contain a large number of species new to science. From the standpoint of anthropology it is one of the least known and most fruitful areas in the Andes."

Topographic Map Proposed.

The plan of work will include the making of a topographical map of the region northwest of Cuzco between the Apurimac and Urubamba rivers; a detailed geographical reconnaissance of the more lofty portions of the mountains, including a study of the large unexplored glaciated region; the establishment of two meteorological stations at different elevations for the taking of systematic records for two years; a study of the distribution and history of food plants of the region; the collection of data respecting the forms of distribution of vertebrates, particularly mammals and reptiles; a survey of the present Indians inhabiting this region, including a study of their dialects, the collection of anthropometric data and the collection and study of the skeletal remains. An archaeological reconnaissance of the entire area and a continuation of the studies begun by the first expedition, looking towards a geographical interpretation of the Spanish chronicles of the era of discovery and exploration, with particular reference to the identification of ancient place names, the story of Machu Picchu and its connection with the history of the Incas.

Director Bingham has made four expeditions to this region. His first, in 1906, being for the purpose of exploring Bolivar's route across Venezuela and Colombia. Two years later he explored the Spanish trade routes from Buenos Aires to Lima. He represented the United States at the first Pan-American Scientific Congress in Santiago de Chile, in 1908.

NEW YORK, April 25.—(Special.)—Mayor William Bruckmann, of Haledon, N. J., the "marrying mayor," performed the first triple marriage ceremony recorded in Passaic County in several years. A large limousine stopped at his office and three couples entered. They presented the usual licenses, and, smiling, the mayor tied the triple knot.

Miss Marie Canova became the bride of Albert Orto, while her brother, Romeo Canova, took as his bride Miss Quineta Aquardi. Then Miss Modesta Almone married Andrea Ferro.

MOTOR INVENTOR IS DEAD

Fernand Forest Built First Vertical Engine in Paris in 1881.

PARIS, April 25.—Fernand Forest, the inventor of the internal explosion engine, which rendered possible the

automobile and the aeroplane, died under circumstances marked by the irony of fate.

An accident which befell his motorboat, the Gazelle, which, built from his designs in 1888, was the first ever constructed, was the cause of his death.

Just before noon he started with his son in the Gazelle to make a full-speed run over a measured mile. After the run the boat was returning to the harbor at fairly high speed when she scraped against a rock. The damage was not serious, and she continued on her course toward shore. M. Forest, however, who was 71, was greatly alarmed by the collision.

"We are lost," he exclaimed to his son. In vain the son tried to calm his father's excitement. The aged inventor fainted, and though he was carried to a drug store, where attempts were made to revive him, he died without regaining consciousness.

In 1881 M. Forest constructed the first vertical engine driven by gas. In 1882 he designed an explosion motor, and in 1883 a four-cylinder engine which embodied all the main points of the modern explosion engine. He received the decoration of the Legion of Honor three years ago.

M. Forest's only fault was being born before his time. His lack of funds and the vagaries of the French patent law and the fact that the world was not ready for a light motor combined to deprive him of the fruits of his genius. His inventions were taken up and perfected by others in the automobile craze at the beginning of the century.

WOOL SOLD AT ADVANCE

175,000 POUNDS OF SMYTHES' CLIP BRING 18 1/2 CENTS.

Portland Woolen Mills Buy Lot for Oregon Manufacturing—Heppner Reports 500,000-Pound Sales.

PENDLETON, Or., April 27.—(Special.)—The largest individual wool sale made in the Northwest this season was consummated here late this evening when Charles H. Carter, representing the Portland Woolen Mills, purchased the coarse wool half of the Smythe Bros' clip, at Arlington, amounting to 175,000 pounds. The price paid was 18 1/2 cents, an increase of 3 1/2 cents over last year's price for the same clip.

Smythe Bros. are probably the largest woolgrowers in the Northwest, and the clip sold this evening is said to be the best that ever came out of Arlington. It is from half-blood Lincoln sheep, is exceptionally clean, strong of fiber and well grown.

Several buyers have been trying to reach the price for many days, but it was not until this evening that the Portland Woolen Mills, the local member of the sheep firm, The fine wool half of the clip is yet to be sold.

This is the first time in many years that the Smythe clip has been purchased for local consumption, it being the intention of the purchasers to manufacture this wool into clothing in Portland.

More than 50,000 fleeces, or nearly 500,000 pounds of wool, have been sold at Heppner within the past few days, according to T. J. Mahoney, cashier of the bank at Heppner. The prices have been 2 cents or more in advance of the prices paid for the same clips last year and ranged from 15 1/2 to 19 cents per pound.

HAIRPINS CAUSE DEATH

Woman, Said to Have Swallowed 100, Dies After Three Operations.

NEW YORK, April 25.—(Special.)—After being operated on three times for the removal of hairpins from her stomach, Mrs. Alice Bischof, 43, died in the Manhattan State Hospital, the insane on Ward's Island. She is believed to have swallowed 100 hairpins since last September. An X-ray picture taken last night before she died showed a mass of the pins in the large intestine.

Mrs. Bischof had been in the hospital for some time. She was moved there from the Matteawan Asylum.

ROAD BOND ISSUE CARRIES

Lewiston Orchard Highway Vote on \$100,000 Is 144 to 9.

LEWISTON, Idaho, April 27.—(Special.)—By a vote of 144 to 9, the election in the Lewiston Orchard highway district for the issuance of \$100,000 bonds was carried. Bryden avenue has been selected for the east and west route between Fifth street and the Train road.

Construction work is to commence early in June, so that the road will be available for use in marketing the fruit crops this fall.

POKER SUCCEEDS WHISKY

'Dry' Town in New Jersey Scandalized by Sunday Raid.

DAVENPORT, Wash., April 27.—(Special.)—John P. Volite, a pioneer salarman of this city, and his clerk for several years, Mrs. Louisa Geifler, after having pleaded guilty for the third time in three months to bootlegging, are in the county jail, financially embarrassed by the payment of previous fines amounting to nearly \$1000, and they now face conviction and continuous imprisonment for many months on six other charges which will be preferred against them.
