

Sixty-yard hurdles—Eight seconds; by Jack R. Case, same time and place Javelin throw—184 feet 9½ inches; by Harry B. Liversedges, at Stanford.

One-mile run—Four minutes, 262-5 seconds, by S. B. Berry, at Berkeley, Cal., on April 11.

All these records have been accepted by the Pacific Association.

Liversedge's javolin throw will supplant Brodd's record of 169 feet 184 inches, made June 14, 1913. Berry's mile in 4 minutes 28 2-5 seconds will be a new world's record for interscholastic running if accepted.
