"This town has changed since I was here last," said S. M. Hunt. of Springfield, Mass., as he registered at the Perkins Thursday.

In those days it required from three to six months to go from Boston to San Francisco. The elipper ship Fleetwing, of Boston, of which Mr. Huntwas third mate, came in 120 days. Built of Yankee wood on Yankee ways and manned by Yankee saliors, they made the United States the greatest maritime nation of the middle nine-teenth century.


