# JURY IS CRITICISED

Bridge Approach Probe Due to Friendship for Mr. Heusner, Is Allegation.

UNION AVENUE IS UPHELD

George M. Hyland Fails to Obtain Plans for Derby-Street Project From Which to Submit Proposal to Build It.

Activities of T. A. Ketchum, foreman of the grand jury, in the matter of the Oregon approach to the Columbia River interstate bridge are inspired by his friendship for George F. Heusner, Attorney John F. Logan said yestorday before the County Commissioners in a debate with George M. Hyland, who has advocated the building of the ap-

has advocated the building of the approach from Derby street, rather than Union avenue, which has been selected by the Commissioners.

"I represent Union avenue property holders," said Mr. Logan. "I am one of them, and am prejudiced for that reason, but I am a paid attorney to appear here before you on behalf of all those property holders and the great majority of the residents of Portland.

"We out there who favor the Union avenue approach have been traduced, watched and spied upon as being fawatched and spied upon as being fa-vorable to the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. I am not repre-senting that company, but in this in-stance I would not be ashamed to rep-resent them.

Grand Jury Work Denounced.

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"We welcome any fair investigation of the selection of Union avenue approach for this bridge, but the grand jury, with Mr. Ketchum, in league with Huesner, as foreman, cannot give a fair investigation. We have nothing to conceal, but we resent the action of the grand jury in dragging up our citizens for questioning by such a partisan. Union avenue is certainly getting the worst of it."

Mr. Logan joined in the consideration of the bridge approach after Mr. Hyland had appeared and asked the Commissioners to direct Waddell & Harrington to prepare plans and specifications for an approach from Derby street, from which information Mr. Hyland might submit a proposal to construct the approach. The request was made after the engineers had reported to the Commissioners that they would not pass judgment on the offer of Mr. Hyland to build the Derby street approach unless he would sumbit an ileinized statement of the amount and quality of the work he would do for \$224.464. uality of the work he would do for

Delay is Requested.

This request was refused by the Commissioners, after which Mr. Hyland acked Commissioner Holman, who, he said, had the balance of power in the matter, to stipulate that no further action would be taken by the Commissioner, or any further expense incurred, until the Supreme Court has passed on the legality of the bridge bond issue. Mr. Logan said he would advise Commissioner Holman to bind himself in no way to anyone, but to remain alert only to the interests of the county and the people he has taken an oath to serve. This practically was the position Mr. Holman announced he would assume. Delay Is Requested.

Mr. Hyland called attention to the understanding at the time the bonds were voted that \$500,000 should be used for the Oregon approach, and announced that if this much money were allowed him, he would build both approaches. This was opposed by Commissioner Lightner, who said that Heldrich & Cochrane, engineers, of Kansas City, had said that the single approach could not be built for that amount Mr. Logan opposed the offer, favoring in its stead that one good approach be built rather than two poor ones, and then later the second one can be built.
