

FOREMAN OF GRAND JURY IS CRITICISED

Bridge Approach Probe Due to Friendship for Mr. Heuser. Is Allegation.

UNION AVENUE IS UPHELD

George M. Hyland Fails to Obtain Plans for Derby-Street Project From Which to Submit Proposal to Build It.

Activities of T. A. Ketchum, foreman of the grand jury in the matter of the Oregon approach to the Columbia River interstate bridge are inspired by his friendship for George F. Heuser.

"I represent Union avenue property holders," said Mr. Hyland. "I am one of them, and am prejudiced for that reason, but I am a paid attorney to appear here before you on behalf of all those property holders and in the great majority of the residents of Portland."

"We out there who favor the Union avenue approach have been traduced, watched and spied upon as being favorable to the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. I am not representing that company, but in this instance I would not be ashamed to represent them."

Grand Jury Work Denounced. "We welcome any fair investigation of the selection of Union avenue approach for this bridge and of the grand jury, with Mr. Ketchum, in league with Heuser, as foreman, cannot give a fair investigation. We have nothing to conceal, but we resent the action of the grand jury in dragging up our citizens for questioning by such a partisan. Union avenue is certainly getting the worst of it."

Delay Is Requested. "This request was refused by the Commissioners, after which Mr. Hyland asked Commissioner Holman, who he said, had the balance of power in the matter, to stipulate that no further action would be taken by the Commission, or any further expense incurred, until the Supreme Court has passed on the legality of the bridge bond issue."

Warning is Voiced. "Warning was issued by Mr. Logan, and seconded by Mr. Hyland, against building the approach to the tunnel with any private interests, which might later embarrass the county."

Mr. Hyland called attention to the understanding at the time the bonds were voted that \$500,000 should be used for the Oregon approach, and announced that if this money were allowed him, he would build both approaches. This was opposed by Commissioner Lightner, who said that Heldrich & Cochran, engineers, of Kansas City, had said that the single approach could not be built for that amount.

\$300 GIVEN; \$3000 ASKED

Verdict in Second "Ice Cream" Case Awarded to Plaintiff.

After a second trial of the "ice cream" case, a jury in Circuit Judge McClain's court yesterday rendered a verdict for \$300 for A. H. Sandstrom against the O-W-R. & Company for damages resulting to his property from the construction of the long tunnel at University Park. Suit was brought for \$3000, charging that streets closed for the construction of the tunnel bottled him in and that soot, smoke and gas escaping from the tunnel had damaged his property.

GOVERNMENT AID URGED

Commercial Club Governors Indorse Black Canyon Project.

A resolution indorsing the Black Canyon irrigation project in Idaho and supporting Secretary of the Interior Lane in his efforts to have Congress appropriate \$100,000 for the completion of this and other projects was adopted yesterday by the board of governors of the Commercial Club. A copy of the resolution will be sent to Secretary Lane and to the Oregon delegation in Congress.
