EXAMINATION PLANS CHANGED

Plans for the Civil Service examination for the position of examiner of accounts, Interstate Commerce Commission, with a salary of from \$2200 to \$3000 per annum, to be held in Portland June 8, have been changed, according to information received yesterday by Thomas V. Hutchins, local Civil Service secretary. The examination will not be held in person. They will be rated on evidence contained in their applications, which must reach the Commission at Washington not later than June 8.

HENRY CHAPMAN DIED—Henry Chapman

, an old resident of Lents, died Wednesday. The funeral will be held today at 2 P. M. from the Lents Evangelical Church, and interment will be in Multnomah Cemetery. Death was caused by heart disease. Mr. Chapman came to Oregon 25 years ago, and had been a resident of Lents for 20 years. He served in the secret service of the United States Government during the Civil War, he took an active part in political affairs in Multnomah County in early days, and served as director of the Lents school district before it was annexed to Portland. He was born in Iowa April 16, 1849, and survived by his wife, three sons and three daughters—Charles, Arthur and Robert Chapman, Mrs. George Wise, Misses Minnie and Bell Chapman, all of whom live near Lents.

AGED PROSPECTOR JAILED

S. McKee Accused of Starting Forest Fires in Southern Oregon.

Simon McKee, an aged pioneer

mining prospector of the Blakely Mountains, arrested Thursday by Deputy Marshal Fuller on charge of starting fires in the National forest, was lodged in the County Jail in Portland yesterday. It is expected that relatives will furnish bond for him in a few days. District Attorney Roams and the forest service officials believe that McKee is largely responsible for forest fires that occurred in Southern Oregon last summer.

The arrest was made on the testimony

of three prospectors that they had seen McKee going through the forest with a torch made of fern setting fires as he went.

BOOKS OPEN WEDNESDAY

THOSE NOT REGISTERING FOR PRIMARIES MAY HAVE CHANCE.

County Officials Who Have Studied Conditions Believe About 15,000 More Will Qualify.

For the benefit of those who did not register for the primaries, the registration books will open next Wednesday and remain open until September 9. They will be closed on that date and opened again September 24, to remain open until October 15, when they will be closed finally before the November election.

Many persons who did not care or for some reason were unable to take

part in the primaries, it is believed will register before the Fall election. The total registration in Multnomah County is 74,961. County officials and politicians who have studied conditions believe that there will be approximately 15,000 more to register before the books are finally closed.

Other important dates relative to election matters follow:

May 18—Candidates tied for nomination for county office notified by County Clerk.

May 20—Last date contest of nomination can be filed.

May 25—Last date for any person, other than a candidate, who has spent \$50 or more during campaign, to file sworn itemized statement of expenses.

May 30—Last date on which contest of nomination may be heard in Circuit Court.

May 31—Last date on which candidates must file sworn itemized statements of campaign expenses.

May 31—Last date on which demand can be made for financial statement from candidate.

June 1—Last date on which election returns must be received by Secretary of State.

June 12—Candidates tied for nomination to be voted on at general election must be filed.

June 13—Certificates of nomination issued.

July 2—Last date on which initiative petitions to be voted on at general election must be filed.

July 12—Last date on which initiative petitions to be voted on at general election must be filed.

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
