In order absolutely to guarantee the standard of quality of all entries and features appearing in the big daylight of Friday, June 12, when all fraternal, industrial, civil and military organizations of the city and vicinity will join in the final public demonstration of the Rose Festival week, the board of censors has issued a set of rules and regulations governing en-

These rules are as follows:

"Your attention is directed to the following action of the censor committee of the Rose Festival Auxiliary.

"The committee has adopted the fol-lowing rules to govern the uniforms of the marchers and marching bodies in the civic, industrial and fraternal pa-

"Rule 1.—A uniform shall consist of the following parts, all of which shall be of uniform color, design and gen-"(a) Hat, cap or other headgear.



"Rule 3—The committee will register the description of such uniform when accepted by them and no organization will be permitted to enter the parade without having taken such action. "Rule 4—The committee has the power to exclude from the parade any organization who, in the judgment of the committee or the inspector, does not conform to the standard of such registered uniform, or any individual member who does not conform in uniform or equipment to the others of his organization."
