Bishop Bell will speak every night during the conference week at the night meetings which will be held at the Sunday, June 1, in the morning and evening. Professor Billhorn, who will conduct the music during conference week, will arrive Monday from Chicago.

NEWMAN PLEADS GUILTY

Sam Newman, indicted last fall for having obscene pictures in his possession, was returned from Seattle, where he was arrested, pleaded guilty yesterday before Circuit Judge Morrow and was fined \$500. Newman was brought back by Sheriff Word during the winter and first entered a plea of not guilty. The pictures were being used for display by means of lanterns, at a motorcycle club. George Harris, indicted for burglary, was allowed to plead guilty to a larceny charge yesterday. Judge Morrow sentenced Harris to 30 days in jail.

The improvement was to be on Clackamas street from Union avenue to East Seventh street, on East Seventh from Clackamas to Broadway and on Halsey street from Union avenue to East Seventh street.

JONES GIVES LONG SENTENCE

Harry Jones was given 270 days in jail by Municipal Judge Stevenson within eight hours after he was caught by Police Chief Inakey and a squad breaking into the Van Garder confectionery at 339 East Burnside streets at an early hour yesterday. He had broken into the store with a heavy file, rifled the till of \$3 and stolen some edibles.

The specific charges before the medical board were unprofessional and dishonorable conduct based on the criminal procedure in the Federal Court.
