Raising of 220-Foot Staff Requires Much Preparation.

CONCRETE BASE IS MADE

Derrick 100 Feet High to Be Used Star Ten Feet Across Will Adorn Top-Queen Thelma to Unfurl 49-Foot Flag.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4 .- The feat of raising from the horizontal to the perpendicular the longest single-piece flagpole in the world—it will stand 222 feet above the ground—will be attempted tomorrow at the Fanama-Pacific Exposition grounds. The pole is a perfect Oregon fir, the donation of the City of Astoria and efforts are bethe City of Astoria, and efforts are be ing made to have it ready by Saturday, when Miss Thelma Hollingsworth, of Portland, Queen of the Portland Rose Festival, is scheduled to hoist the first

How to get the pole erect presented an engineering problem which required elaborate preparations. The first prob-lem considered was wind pressure. This was estimated at 30 pounds to the square foot, and on this basis a con-crete anchorage 20 feet square and 12 feet deep has been built.

The pole will stand on the exposition The pole will stand on the exposition grounds near the beach, and it will be floated to position. The butt will be slid into a groove in the concrete block and then the giant will be hoisted by means of a shear-leg derrick 100 feet high, and a donkey engine. To prevent the pole from swelling with mois-ture and cracking the concrete base it has been treated to a water-proofing process and then coated with metal roofing at the base. It will be supported by guys until the concrete is firmly set, but when the exposition opens it will stand alone, flying a 40-

foot flag, also a gift of Astoria.

At the top of the pole a star, similar in design to those which adorn smaller flagpoles about the grounds, has been attached. This star measures 10 feet from tip to tip.

Good Things in Markets

To many eyes, the most attractive offering in market this week is the new "Rose June" cherry from The Dalles. This recent development, apparently a cross between the Royal Anne and the Bing, is remarkably beautiful in coloring, large in size and of a slightly tart flavor. It cannot fail to be very popular. At present they retail for 25 cents a pound. Though the general opinion is that the cherry crop will not be quite as abundant as some years considerable. abundant as some years, considerable fruit is coming forward. Some very large Royal Annes are offered at 20 cents a pound and of smaller size two pounds for a quarter. Several other varieties, including the Kentish, or pie oherry, are bringing 12% cents a

Strawberries are prebably about their height. Some strictly local, and classed "extra fancy," are selling at three boxes for 25 cents, but the Oregon crop, as a whole, is averaging 5 cents a box. In crates of 20 boxes they may be had as low as 3 cents a box, though choice fruit, in some instances, is bringing as high as \$2 a crate.

The newest arrival is Hungarian plums from California, for which 40 cents a basket is asked, the same price as apricots, which are rapidly increas-ing in size, however, making 10 cents for a dozen seem less of an extravagance. Peaches are still scarce enough to bring 30 cents a dozen. Cantaloupes at 10 cents and pineapples at 25 cents each will probably change hands more rapidly as the weather warms up. Bananas, large and ripe, are 15 and

20 cents a dozen The muster roll of small fruits now includes red currants, local, at 12% and 15 cents a box; raspherries at 18 and loganberries at 5 cents a box; blackberries in quart boxes at 10 cents and gooseberries, the "moss-back" variety, from The Dalles, at two boxes for 15 cents, and plump local fruit at

dozen. Lemons, 25 to 30 cents. Apples have narrowed down, evidently, to Arkansas Black at 25 and 20 cents, and arrest.

New potatoes are now six pounds for 25 cents, the sweet variety two pounds for 15. California celery has come down to 5, 10 and 15 cents a stalk, and cucumbers to 10, 15 and two for 25 cents. Some seedless, hothouse cucumbers, from ten to 12 inches in length, are 20 and 25 cents each.

Mexican "refugee" beans are 15 cents a pound, or two pounds for a quarter, as are also wax beans. Head lettuce, at 5 and 10 cents each, and hothouse stock, at three bunches for a dime, looked green and fresh. Rhubarb and dried onlons are each 5 cents a pound; cauliflower, 5 and 10 cents each and Summer squash, 15 cents a pound.

California corn, at 75 cents a dozen Florida tomatoes, at 20 cents a pound; green bell peppers, at 40 cents a pound; plant at 30 cents and mushrooms at 75 cents a pound are all admittedly "costly" class, though for a

short time only.

The large and weekly increasing list of Oregon-grown vegetables is very gratifying. Oregon asparagus, at 15 cents a bunch, and artichokes, at 10 cents each or three for a quarter; good cabbage at 5 cents a head; spinach, two pounds for 15 cents; radishes, green onions, beets, turnips, carrots—all are in profusion and freshness, and


