

SCHOOL ELECTION IS EXPEDITIOUS

Status of Married Women in Schools Left to Civic League by Teachers.

FREE TEXTBOOK IS ISSUE

Adoption of Measure Means Outlay of Nearly \$100,000 in This District—Polling Places Different From Regular Elections.

The teachers' committee of the Board of Education will not meet tonight, as originally planned, to take up the complex question of whether married women, whose husbands are able to support them, shall be permitted to teach in the public schools.

At this luncheon the Civic League committee, which, at the last meeting of the Board of Education, protested against enforcement of the policy barring married women from the schools, will make a report.

A list of polling places for next Monday's school election, at which a successor to R. L. Sablin, on the Board of Education, is to be elected, and the state free text-book law accepted or rejected by taxpayers of this district, was made out yesterday by School Clerk Robert H. Thomas.

Only taxpayers participate in the school election, but each taxpayer is entitled to a vote, whether a man or woman. A taxpayer is not required to vote at his home ward polling place, but may cast his ballot at any polling place on the list.

There are three candidates for school director in the race to be decided by Monday's election. They are H. B. Miller, Dr. Alan Welch Smith and Dr. L. Victoria Hampton.

Free Text-Book Issue Keen. Much interest centers in the free text-book law. If the measure is adopted by the taxpayers of this school district, the Board of Education will be required to expend practically \$100,000 for text-books.
